Group says there's enough
BOWLING GREEN, Ky. (AP) - The leader of a statewide anti-lottery group said there is enough opposition to defeat a proposal for a state lottery when it appears on the ballot next month.

Phil Thompson, director of the state Citizens Against State Lottery, told those at attendance at a meeting Friday of CASL a Warren County effort that the group's position looks increasingly better.

"The numbers are changing, and there's no question that our line is going up," he said. "I'm here to tell you that it is going to be a close race. Thompson said the anti-lottery group's task is beginning to take a new twist as the election draws closer.

"Our challenge now is to identify those people who oppose the lottery and get them to the polls," he said. "Secondly, we must identify those who are undecided and get the facts to them."

CASL has branches in 106 of Kentucky's 120 counties. The group will continue an extensive telephone and advertising campaign during the next two weeks.

"There are 17 days left in the campaign, and we think we are further ahead than the governor was 17 days before the primary," he said. "He was never ahead in the poll except on Election Day."

CASL contends that the proposed lottery will be bad for Kentucky. Thompson said the lottery would pull most of its money from those who can't afford it and that it would not work in Kentucky because population and per capita income are too low.

PSC grants gas increase
LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - The Public Service Commission on Friday granted Columbia Gas of Kentucky \$2.2 million a year of a \$7.4 million rate increase request.

The decision, released Friday, means an average increase of \$1.13 per month for gas customers, said Pam Johnson, director of the utility and rate intervention division of the attorney general's office.

Columbia had filed for the rate increase in April, and the attorney general's office held public hearings on the issue in August. Its last rate increase was in November 1986, when the company was granted half of a \$7.6 million increase request.

The gas company serves about 120,000 customers in 20 central and eastern Kentucky counties.

Acid rain a problem
LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) - The next U.S. president will address the problem of acid-rain control and legislation will be passed in the next session of Congress, the Canadian ambassador to the United States predicted Friday.

The ambassador, Allan Gottlieb, spoke at the annual Mineral Law Seminar sponsored by the University of Kentucky College of Law.

Gottlieb said both presidential candidates are firmly on record as favoring substantial acid-rain reduction programs with specific targets and dates, and he said it is not merely election-year rhetoric.

"I think this is a genuine recognition of the problem. I have no doubt that each of them will address it," he said.

He said the public seems increasingly insistent that environmental issues, including acid rain, be moved up the public policy agenda.

"Congress came closer this year to passing legislation than any other time, and I think next year there is a good chance they'll make it," Gottlieb said.

Acid rain in Canada is blamed in part on sulphur dioxide emissions from the U.S. coal-fired power plants. Canada is calling for a 50 percent cut in acid rain crossing the border from the United States.

"We've had good cooperation on the environment for most of our history, as joint tenants of North America, and we can't solve this problem without your help here in the U.S.," he said.
