Weather Summary

AGRI-FORECAST

As gulf moisture spreads north, cloudiness will be widespread across Kentucky. The southerly winds carrying that moisture are associated with the advance of a cold front from the northern plains.

Its approach to the area will be slow and cooler air behind it is expected to cause temperatures to fall only a few degrees.

Tobacco growers will need to manage harvest carefully in order to keep conditions favorable. Conditions for curing leaves in the field will improve a little mid week but some threat of showers may develop as the front remains in the vicinity.

Mild temperatures mid week will favor harvest of fruit and vegetable crops.

The reduced risk of wetting along with lighter west to northwest winds developing from the west Tuesday and Wednesday should provide the next best opportunity for the application of agricultural chemicals.
