Bluejackets fall on the road to Frankfort, 41-0

FRANKFORT — In their first away game of the 1988-89 season, the Nicholas County Bluejackets were defeated, 41-0, by the Frankfort High School Panthers.
 The loss dropped Nicholas County's record to 1-3 for the year.
 Nicholas County rallied in the second half, not to a victory, but to hold Frankfort High School to only two touchdowns.
 Head Coach Bob Barr said the younger boys, the freshmen, played well and he was pleased with Jahren Fara's performance as quarterback.

In the first half the Panthers scored four touchdowns. There were 11 flags thrown in the second half. Only three were penalties against the Bluejackets.
 Frankfort padded its 28-0 halftime lead, returning the second half kickoff 65 yards for the score, to lead 35-0, with the extra point conversion.
 Penalties marked second half action.
 Frankie Johnson's helmet flew off as he ran on first down. A flag was thrown and the Panthers were called for a face mask infraction.
 On the next play, the Panthers were called for a personal foul.
 On the Panthers' 25 yard line, second down and eight to go, the Panthers were called for unsportsmanlike conduct.
 After an illegal motion penalty against Nicholas, the Panthers made a touchdown which brought the score up to 41-0. The team attempted a two point conversion, but the Jackets thwarted that play.
 Assistant Coach Stan Powers noted that "If they can just hold them, (at their own 50) that would be beautiful."
 The Bluejackets then took control of the ball, as Collier Mathes made a four yard gain before an illegal motion penalty was called on the Panthers and a personal foul was called on the Jackets.
 After a four yard gain by the Panthers, the Bluejackets took over on their own two yard line. There was a flag again, for too many players on the field on the Panthers.
 With 2:46 left in the game Nicholas County was called for holding.
 On the next play, there was a false start call for the Panthers.
 On the next to the last play, there were offsetting penalties — the wear a personal foul called on William Workman, and a facemask penalty on the Panthers.
 In the first half Daniel Brown was taken off the field in a stretcher with a head injury, but he has recovered.
