Another reason companies may hide their identity is to keep cities from hoarding them about moving, he said.

"This year the group plans to put together information packages to send to small industries throughout the state, he said.

Hopefully, this plan will catch a manufacturer as they are contemplating a move and Carlisle will be in the right place at the right time, he explained.

Their goals for the industrial authority revolve around things "meshing together."

Ideally, a small industry employing from 25 to 150 people, would find "the best economic solution would be to come to Carlisle."

Mostly, to make things mesh, the Industrial Authority provides incentives. It may take a few years to install a new industry in Carlisle, Burke said, but when they decide to move, they want to move in three months.

"And the best prepared city will win," he said. One of this year's goals is a "spec building." This would be a building on the site of the Industrial Park, which would simply be an empty building over 10,000 square feet.

Kentucky state regulatory statutes also offer other incentives. While an industrial authority cannot offer cash, they can offer reduced land prices and alternatives for companies to build.

For example, if a company leases a building from the Industrial Authority, the amount of the lease can be written off of the company's taxes.

In turn, the Industrial Authority would no longer have to look to the city and county governments for funding, since it would then have an income.

He stressed that no member of the Industrial Authority can benefit from their position, but everyone benefits indirectly.

He sites statistics used by the Chamber of Commerce to show exactly how much new industry can benefit a community. For every 100 manufacturing jobs, there are 13 new homes built, five retail stores will be opened and 26 new residents will come into the community, not to mention children who will come into the school system.

The competition is nationwide for gaining new industry, Burke said, but things are looking better for Carlisle than they ever have, he said.

Because they are actively seeking out business and industry, authorities are recommending Carlisle to companies looking for new places to settle.

Seven years before the Industrial Authority began, Carlisle had only four industry contacts, Burke said. In the past two years, they have had six contacts.

"To sum it all up, Burke said

one reason many people hadn't heard about it was the Industrial Authority's goal, and when the authority succeeds, the entire community benefits.

Why do we go through all the time and effort? It took to come up with the new bill because you are our customer, and "Customer First" is a value that South Central Bell takes very seriously. We don't want to cut corners when it comes to your concerns about service.

The first bills featuring the new design should arrive in Carlisle mailboxes late this year or early in 1989. If you receive more information about the new bill as that time draws closer.

Did you know that you have several alternatives for paying your South Central Bell bill every month?

If you're interested in saving postage over time, you can arrange to pay your phone bill by bank draft. Under the plan, your bank will receive your phone bill and deduct that amount from your checking account. **Amnesty**

 subject you to an audit?

Information supplied by the taxpayer under an application for amnesty is subject to verification. But asking for amnesty does not increase the likelihood you will be audited.

If you seek amnesty and are later audited, are you subject to further taxation?

Yes. If an audit determines further tax liability, you will be subject to the full penalty and interest. The best advice is to disclose all liabilities during the amnesty.

What happens if you owe back taxes but don't seek amnesty?

The Revenue Cabinet insists its increased enforcement efforts will find you. Further-

more, after the amnesty ends, the cabinet will impose a collection fee of 20 percent to 50 percent of the back taxes owed. The amnesty law also provides for a new penalty of 50 percent if there is a finding there was an intent to evade taxes.

Are there any other punitive measures for people failing to take advantage of amnesty?

The law also provides for the first time that corporate officers can be held personally liable for back taxes, penalty and interest owed from sales and coal severance taxes.

Will delinquent taxes paid under amnesty be reported to the Internal Revenue Service?

Forever. The law stipulates that this is a one-time opportunity.

probably yes. But many of the taxes eligible for amnesty have no comparable federal tax, such as the state sales tax. How can you obtain information about tax amnesty?

Taxpayer service centers are located in Ashland, Bowling Green, Corbin, Frankfort, Hazard, Hopkinsville, Lexington, Louisville, Fort Mitchell, Owensboro, Paducah, and Pikeville. You can also call, toll-free, 1-800-321-5565 or write to Amnesty, Kentucky Revenue Cabinet, P.O. Box 1524, Frankfort, Ky. 40602.
