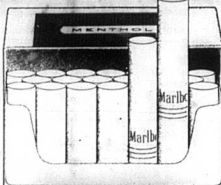


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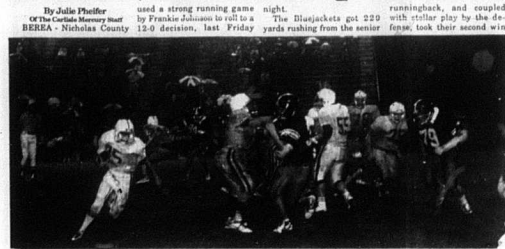

### Greyhounds loom next for Bluejackets

CARLISLE - Nicholas County's football Bluejackets returns home Friday night to face tough rival Paris. The Jackets are coming off a 12-0 win at Berea last Friday night, while Paris suffered a loss on the road at Mercer County.

Paris has a long standing tradition of power football teams, and the 1988 team is no different, according to

### Cats take tumble at Indiana

BLOOMINGTON, Ind (AP) - After allowing Kentucky too much third-down yardage, Indiana found the best defense was to keep its offense on the field.

"We wanted to mix it up," Coach Bill Mallory said after Saturday's 36-15 college football victory over the Wildcats. "We thought we had to. We had to have good ball control offense."

"Soundness and poise is what we lacked last year (in a 34-15 loss to Kentucky), but we know what we were doing this time," Mallory said.

The Hoosiers, who had 166 yards rushing and two touchdowns by junior Anthony Thompson, had their offense on the field almost 17 minutes longer than Kentucky's. In the fourth quarter, the Hoosiers allowed Kentucky possession for just over two minutes.

"They controlled the line of scrimmage offensively and defensively," Kentucky coach Jerry Claiborne said. "We were not as intense as we were in the stadium game (last week), but I can't take anything away from Indiana just yet after our poor performance. Depth is our problem," Claiborne said.
