Lady Jackets face Paris, Bourbon, Harrison in Harrison County Christmas tournament

 The Nicholas County Lady Jackets will play three regional rivals in the Harrison County Girls' Basketball tournament December 27-29 in Cynthiana.

The Lady Jackets have been fortunate to have been able to play their games before the winter snows forced school closings.

Thus, they have had at least that much court experience going into the tournament.

But NCHS Head Coach Barbara Kenney, whose team is 5-1, said the games scheduled for the Lady Jackets will throw some of the toughest competition they have had this year and will test their ability against far more experienced teams.

The tournament will be played round-robin style with the Jackets facing a team Kenney said would be the most difficult to overcome: the Paris Lady Greyhounds.

Ranked in the top 10, Kenney said Paris has a very strong defense led by their lead rebounder, Yolanda Brown.

"Brown averages high in rebounds and I think she will give our offense the most trouble," Kenney said.

Paris has a tough man-to-man defense and the Greyhounds are a strong, well-conditioned team, Kenney said.

They also have a key shooter with the ability to lay in crucial 3-pointers from anywhere on the court, Kenney said.

"They could well be a better team than Bourbon County," Kenney said. Bourbon County is the only team to hand Nicholas County's girls a defeat thus far this season.

However, Nicholas stands a good chance of upsetting the top-ranked team as long as they can control the pace of the game and work as a unit rather than having the offense attempt to work alone.

Facing Harrison County Lady Fillies at 9:00 Thursday, Kenney said Harrison will be the most physically demanding on the Jackets.

"They're a big team. They have a senior center and forward manning 6-foot-1 each and can play well on the boards," Kenney said.

Kenney has coached at least one girl on the Harrison County team and said the Fillies have traditionally been a challenge for the Lady Jackets, as they will be this year as well, she said.

Nicholas will be the opener against Fleming County on Friday and the young Lady Jackets' team will be playing against a very experienced Lady Panthers team, Kenney said.

"They will start about three to four seniors playing against our team with one senior, two sophomores, a freshman and an eighth grader," Kenney said.

The Lady Panthers have quick guards and the Greyhounds are equal in size to Kim Jenkins and should present problems for the 6-foot eighth grader. However, Kenney said, the girl has a tendency to tire by the second half, an advantage Kenney is counting on, she said.

But, the rest of the team is in super shape, she said, and will be able to keep up the pressure throughout the entire game.

Though the tournament does not count on the regular season record, Kenney said the tournament will benefit the Jackets with the opportunity to get back on the court and playing.

Since the Manifee County game, the Jackets have had about a week and a half hiatus from game play and Kenney said the girls have showed some signs of practice.

"They have been practicing and playing each other day in and out for quite awhile and they are quite simply tired of seeing the same faces. It is also difficult from my standpoint because in scrimmages, the defense and offense know what is being run, so they are not a strong indicator of actual game play," Kenney said.
