Humidity and heavy rains could be costly to farmers

OWENSBORO (AP) - Humidity and heavy rains could cost Davison County tobacco farmers millions of dollars in damages as about 20 percent of the county's tobacco crop has wilted or drowned because of rain, officials say.
Lee Roy Walker, president of the Owensboro Tobacco Board of Trade, estimated up to 40 percent of the crop has been damaged. "It is a beautiful crop," he said.
Walker said \$7 million worth of fairly tobacco could have been sold this winter. But he said the damage from excess rain was total between \$4 million to \$6 million.
Davison County farmer Robert Krumpke and his son Mark grow about 15 acres of tobacco. On Thursday, 80 percent to 90 percent of about two acres was wilting in the heat and humidity. Krumpke said they had put liquid nitrogen on the crop. "Now we're waiting to see what happens. There's not much we can do if it doesn't bounce back."
Officials also estimate that 30 percent of neighboring McClain County's tobacco crop has been damaged by the moist spring and summer.
McClain County Extension Agent Greg Henson said it may be a week to 10 days before farmers know whether their crop will come back.
"The bigger the tobacco plants, the worse the problem, he said. Tobacco growers with smaller crops will be able to get into their fields and plow the crop, helping to dry the soil.
"As soon as possible, farmers should put some form of nitrogen on the field to reinvigorate the tobacco plants," said Tom Cantuigne, Davison County extension agent for agriculture.
"When problems may cause this year's crop to be thin and light at a time when the demand for tobacco will be high, Walker said. "If we made 97 percent of the basic quota, we could still be 50 million pounds short of what was used this year," he said.
"And we've never made 95 percent."
Davison County farmer Joe Elliott said the tobacco plants are weak and sick because of the weather.
"And you can understand how you'd feel if you were sick and had someone sit there," he said.
