**Ford's Footnotes**

The 1990 session of Kentucky's General Assembly is shaping up as one of the busiest, most interesting and emotional gatherings in recent history.

With the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision on abortion, and Kentucky's own Supreme Court decision on education, 1990 appears to be anything but routine.

In a recent landmark decision, Kentucky's highest court ruled the entire system of public education in the state unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court says present system fails to provide equal educational opportunity to all the state's children.

"The long-awaited Kentucky Supreme Court decision from a suit filed in 1985 by the Council for Better Education, a group of 66 school districts, several of which are in the 30th Senatorial District, against the governor, the speaker of the House, and the president pro tempore of the Senate, and other top state officials, founding the superintendent system of public instruction."

Citing the Kentucky Constitution, the court determined that the Legislature is required to provide an "efficient system of public schools throughout the state."

**Wilkinson announces road plan**

Governor Wallace D. Wilkinson has announced the approved 1989-90 Rural Secondary Program for Nicholas County.

Wilkinson said the state has budgeted \$214,080 for maintenance of the 66.6 miles of rural secondary roads in Nicholas County.

"This program will provide both proper maintenance and upgrading for our rural secondary roads," said Wilkinson.

"A certain amount of money is set aside for basic maintenance and additional funds are allocated throughout the year for improvement projects."

Wilkinson said that the state will place an overlay on the deck of the bridge on Kentucky 386, the Kentucky 13-U.S. 60 Road.

The state will also resurface three miles of Kentucky 13, the Carlisle-Jackson Road, 1.8 miles of County Road 510, Maple Grove Road, and 1,056 feet of County Road 515, Old Kentucky 97 in East Union.

According to State Transportation Secretary and Commissioner of Highways, Milo D. Bryant the projects are estimated to cost \$373,125.

Wilkinson explained that Rural Secondary funds are made possible through collection of the state motor fuels tax, and that distribution of funds is based upon each county's land size, population and rural road mileage.

**Two named to MCC list**

Two Nicholas County students were named to the spring dean's list at Mayville Community College.

Included on the 60 name list were Mike Soby and Donna E. McCard.

To be on the dean's list a student must maintain a 2.5 average on a 4.0 scale and must be enrolled for at least a 12 semester-hour load.

Many Legislators and educators believe the court may have raised as many or more questions than it answered.

One question the court did not answer is how the legislature should pay for the additional improvements school system in the legislative responsibility of the governor.

Legislative leaders have asked for a reasonable extension during the next session of the court imposed deadline of April 15, 1990, as well as asking clarification on several points as to how local taxes should be assessed to fund the system.

We feel that something as important as the future of education in our state and for our children should be approached expeditiously, but not with an attitude of haste for the sake of just meeting a mandated deadline.

In order to comply with the court's mandate, and to prepare ourselves in formulating a plan for improving education during the next session of the Legislature, House and Senate leaders have formed a Special Educational Commission to design a new educational system for Kentucky.

Democratic members of House and Senate leadership, the chairmen of the Appropriations and Revenue and Education committees and two Republican Legislators were

designated to serve on the panel, along with five representatives from the governor's office.

Tentative plans call for the Commission to appoint subcommittees from members of the House and Senate Appropriations and Revenue and Education committees.

Each subcommittee will be assigned a particular area of concentration, such as curriculum, or finance, or governance, or school employees, and to make recommendations back to the Commission.

with proposed legislation. The court declined to say how the General Assembly must restructure Kentucky's school system, saying that it is not the court's role to make policy.

It left the responsibility of how to reorganize and pay for the state's school system solely up to us, your legislators.

The recent decision by Kentucky's Court reflects a growing trend where courts have invalidated school funding mechanisms in several states, including Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Montana, New Jersey, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming.

Several pieces of legislation have already been drafted, one which promises to be a highly controversial and emotional issue, for introduction during the next session in January.
