Tyson doesn't need any kind of real strategy. All he needs is someone foolish enough to get in the ring and leave himself open for a single punch, then pow, lights out and Tyson leaves lightly perspired and several million dollars richer.

He is not so much a boxer as he is a oneman wrecking machine, but at least he doesn't waste time hurting someone beyond what they deserve. The look in his eye and his conviction when he spoke, even when he kidded with Howard Cosell, made him a man to be reckoned with on a far different level than Tyson will ever hope to achieve.

I won't take anything away from Tyson as a boxer. By knocking contenders silly early, he has probably saved many of them from really serious injury at his hands. But, in my own opinion, though Tyson may go down as boxing's most devastating fighter, he will never quite match up to Ali's self named title, " I am The Greatest."
