Letcher to begin NCHS practice

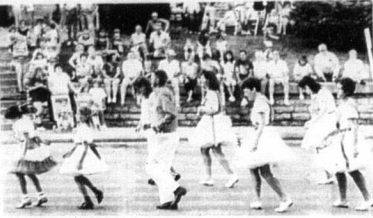

tion at no cost beginning at 6 p.m. at NCHS; for grades 7-12 July 27. Equipment will be issued to high school players. July 31 - Practice begins at 6:30 p.m. in helmets, shorts and shoes. August 1 - Full pads practice begins at 6:30 p.m. August 3 - Parents meeting at 6:30 p.m. August 11 - scrimmages. August 16 - Junior high practice officially begins. Senior citizens from across Kentucky - 3,275 of them - will be setting the pace as the Bluegrass State Games open next week. The seniors, members of the Governor's Pastorseters walking clubs, will help kick off the Bluegrass State Games with a program in Frankfort beginning at 11:30 a.m. July 26, on the steps of the Old Capitol. About 30 Pastorseters from Nicholas County are sponsored by Gene Wallace Wilkinson and the Commonwealth of Kentucky and hosted by Lexington Mayor Steacy Hunter and the Lexington-Payette District County Government. "Senior citizens are a very important part of the Bluegrass State Games," Mayor Haskins said. "After all, one of the main themes of the games is to encourage Kentuckians of all ages to participate in athletic programs." Over 13,000 people are expected to participate in the 5th-10th of the Games, July 28, 29 and 30 in Lexington. About 11,000 Kentuckians have already competed in preliminary rounds.

Carlisle man arrested after police give chase

A Carlisle man was arrested and charged Friday night at 11:40 p.m. after a chase that ended with the driver apparently wrecking in a ditch on Old Paris Road. According to a City of Carlisle Police report, Alex E. Stone, 28, was charged with operating a car under the influence of alcohol, operating a vehicle with a suspended driver's license, reckless and wanton driving to elude police, and wanton endangerment. The report was filed by Carlisle Police officer David Hardin, Jr. According to the report, Hardin followed Stone from Spring Street to Market Street when he observed Stone's car weaving "all over the road." Hardin reported he attempted to stop the suspect with his lights and siren on when Stone apparently "ran" from the officer. Stone, reportedly,

side-wiped a fire hydrant, continued on West Main and struck a rock wall, on Old Paris Road. The report said the car would have struck a Carlisle woman had it not side-wiped wall near an unidentified filling station. The chase, the report said, "wrecked all over the road and came to rest in a ditch." One passenger in the car, Justin Bowles, the report said, wanted out of the car but Stone allegedly would not stop to let her out. According to the report, the officer never lost sight of the subject throughout the chase. Stone was arrested at the scene, the report said. Stone pled not guilty in Circuit Court July 24. A pre-trial hearing will be held August 14, at 11 a.m., according to the Nicholas District Court Calendar.
