**Is Kentucky at Crossroads?.....**

"If Kentucky, which is behind other states, tries to maintain the status quo, I think we're going to continue to see our industries slip away, our best and brightest leave the state," Todd said. "I think it is time we make an intelligent choice to get into the new economy."  
Todd, a native of Earlington in Hopkins County, was trained at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, but returned home to found and run two of the very few high-tech companies Kentucky can boast.  
Projection Inc. designs, develops and manufactures picture tubes for flight simulators. Databeam Corp. is a world leader in teleforecasting systems.  
"The companies are based in Lexington, but have the world as their market. Todd said their combined sales will total \$8 million this fiscal year - none of it in Kentucky.  
"That's not money," Todd said. "That's coming in from around the country and around the world. And it's strictly on brain power. We're not depending on raw materials and natural resources."  
Projection and Databeam together employ 400 people, four-fifths of whom have at least two years of postsecondary education.  
They are "full array" companies, Todd said, meaning they have created a full range of jobs: manufacturing, accounting, scientists, office managers, clerks, janitors.  
"They are a profile of the company for the next decade," Todd said. "They are companies like you have in Boston and California."  
The county, a private, non-profit brainstorming group, believes Kentucky could have more Projection and Databeams. It has proposed an "innovation compact" of Kentucky businesses, government, schools and universities with the stated goal of making Kentucky to show itself into the world marketplace.  
The compact has three main pieces: substantial improvements at all levels of the education system, a generous supply of business start-up and expansion capital, and a state emphasis on research and development.  
Kentucky has lost entrepreneurs to other states because they could not find the financing for their companies, Todd said. And the brain drain has a ripple effect, he said.  
"When we allow our best and brightest kids to graduate in other states, we also lose their children and their children's children," Todd said. Kentucky needs "new decade companies that can hire them."  
On the traditional job front, coal production may remain high through the '90s, but more coal mining jobs will be lost to automation, continuing a trend of the last decade.  
There is the possibility of even heavier job losses in the coal industry if a national energy policy to be modeled in Washington forces utilities to burn less high-sulfur coal, a western Kentucky staple.  
State commerce officials see Kentucky's industrial growth areas as furniture making, food processing, telecommunications and tourism.
