Smoot withstands write-in try

CARLISLE - Nicholas County Clerk Rose Scott said it was the first time in her recollection of 30 years in the office (elected since 1977) she had ever seen voted lined up at 6 p.m.

Four council members repeat in '89 election

CARLISLE - All four incumbents running for seats were: Louise Gines (229), Dennis Allison (304), Bobby Barnett (306) and James Fuller (129). Garrett captured the most votes, 42 in the City Building precinct; Barton won the Engine House Precinct with 155 votes and the Mathias Precinct with 80 votes; Clark won the Mayor's Office Precinct with 132 votes. Barton also had the most absentee votes with 34. Others posing unau-

Myers to hold the judge's seat. Smoot won all 10 precincts, as well as a majority of the absentees, to claim a 1468-855 win, unofficially. Myers had come within 24 votes of Smoot in the democratic primary May 23, and launched a county-wide

Hughes reclaims Mayor's seat from Bentz

CARLISLE - Former Mayor Frankie Hughes has reclaimed the Mayor's seat for the City of Carlisle. Hughes defeated Carmell Lester 221-206.

Incumbent Carlisle Mayor Lee Bentz was a distant third with only 164 votes.

Hughes has served as Carlisle's Mayor from 1982 to

Most races run true to form

Most county-wide races in the final election went unopposed, though there were several one vote write-ins for nearly all positions open at the election.
Two magistrate races boasted a write-in attempt from incumbent Elms Myers, district two, and Melvin Fryman, district one. In the District two race, Daryl Stacy took the total majority vote but lost one leg of the race in Myers. Elms Myers took 95 write-in votes to Stacy's 73.
However, Stacy was able to take the entire race in the Rafferty precinct, 151-32.
Melvin Fryman, meanwhile, launched his own write-in campaign to challenge Democratic nominee Carl Cohorn. But, Fryman's effort met with less success as Cohorn took both Headquarters, 116-53, and Barteville, 91-89.
Earl Lee Planck, district three, took 227 total votes from Moorefield and East Union. Floyd Bussell, district four
