Legislation may affect home

The Federal Government is considering potential legislation requiring all nursing homes be equipped with sprinkler systems to prevent threat of fire following a nursing home tragedy in Norfolk, Virginia two weeks ago.

One nursing home that will be affected by legislation of this kind is the Johnson-Mathers Nursing Home, which built in 1965, was not equipped with a sprinkler system.

Nicholas County Hospital and Johnson-Mathers Nursing Home administrator Rob Hester said the threat of fire is a constant worry and sometimes the causes are unexplained or unanticipated.

Two weeks ago, on a Thursday at 12:30 p.m., the nursing home did have one minor incident when a burning smell was reported coming from one section of the building.

While Hester, Nicholas County Fire Chief Mark Hughes, and other employees searched for the source of the smell, others helped residents in the section evacuate.

There was no smoke or flames of any kind, just the smell which made it difficult to locate, Hester said. However, after a thorough search, the source was located underneath a pile of towels in a linen closet.

Hester said, because it is a fire-alarm building constructed from concrete block it is easy to escape from and resistant to serious fire out breaks.

All material, such as bed curtains and blankets, are all fire resistant as well. There are eight exit doors in the nursing home alone, Hester said.

"No area can be blocked, so far as our present facilities go, we are prepared," Hester said. "Should they lose electrical power, the entire nursing home and hospital complex is fitted with emergency generators."
