Earth day celebration, Friday

CARLISLE, April 18—The Friday Nicholas County will participate in one of the biggest events of 1990, National Earth Day, and hopefully people will become more aware of the hazards threatening our environment and ways we can control the threat.

Phyllis Guthrie, GATE student sponsor and coordinator of Earth Day events in Nicholas County, said planning for the event has mushroomed from a one-day educational awareness week on world environmental concerns and issues.

Student interest in the project began last fall, Guthrie said, when students were required to involve themselves in a Conservation Essay contest sponsored by H.H.

"Students were reluctant about the subject before they got started, but once they became aware of the seriousness of this world's environmental condition, they came up with a lot of unanswered questions and a great deal of concern," Guthrie said.

Since that time, students have been planning an Earth Day event which has gained increasing popularity and interest throughout the entire elementary school.

Focus of the Earth Day event in Nicholas County will be on recycling through the educational side of the program will focus on a wide range of environmental issues.

"Recycling is an activity students can participate and it is a practical way to introduce young students to environmentalism," Guthrie said.

To promote recycling, each home team in the elementary school is participating in an Honorsom Recycling Contest. Students from each home team will be collecting

many aluminum cans to fill a two-ton dumpster truck which will be donated Friday during the walk and parade scheduled that afternoon.

"We estimate we'll need to collect 40,000 aluminum cans to pay for the truck, which averages 1,000 cans per home room," Guthrie said.

What students say they would like to see in Kentucky make recycling a law. In Michigan, recyclable cans are 10 cents when returned to a center which works out better than the pound rate they have in Kentucky, Guthrie said.

In addition to student interest in recycling, Guthrie reported other students have studied a wide variety of environmental concerns. They are alerted to find the hole detected in the ozone layer, that layer of atmosphere that shields the planet from the deadliest solar radiation, is measured to be approximately the size of the United States with the depth of Mt. Everest.

They are deeply concerned with the depletion of the rain forests in South America which provides the Earth with almost 50 percent of its oxygen supply, she said.

A student bill written thank you notes to the Kellogg's Cereal Company thanking them for using recyclable paper, she reported.

Over 100 million people are estimated involved in some kind of Earth Day celebration across the nation.

On Friday, all students, school administrators, and some county public officials will join in a march from the schools to the courthouse and back beginning at 1:30 p.m. Whether the current national interest in the environment is more fad than real concern Guthrie said as long as the benefits this country sees here, then she has no trouble following fashion.
