The board will pursue investigations into the background of each candidate and talk with their colleagues about their performance and track record in school administration, Anderson said.

"There are no leaders at this time. Everyone is still in it. We're very impressed with each candidate which will make our decision most difficult," Anderson said.

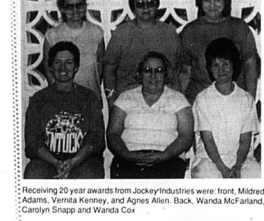

**Jackets improve to 8-3 winning four out of five**

CARLISLE — Nicholas County's baseball team improved to 8-3 in action last week.  
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Nicholas County took a 8-0 lead over Bracken County after six innings, allowed the Polar Bears two in the top of the seventh, as Nicholas County clinched an 8-2 decision.  
David Silbert went the distance for the Jackets to pick up his second win in two decisions.  
Silbert also had two hits and two runs batted in for NCIS. Also with two hits were Brad Briery, Daniel Brown, Kevin Morris, and Brian Hilder.

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Next up for NCIS was Lexington.  
Kept by two hits and three runs batted in by Brown and three hits, plus two hits by Silbert, Nicholas County posted a 9-2 after three innings and went on to claim an 11-7 decision.

Sybre made the final a little closer with five runs in the top half of the seventh inning. NCIS committed six errors in the game, while pounding out 12 hits.  
Jarrod Wills came on in relief in the first inning and picked up the win.

"We an awfully young team this season, said veteran coach Billy Anderson. "We normally start one freshman, six sophomores, and two juniors, plus our designated is a junior."

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The Jackets jumped on Maysville for a 5-0 lead after two innings, but allowed the Bulldogs back in the game. Maysville knotted the score at 2-2 with four runs in the third and one in the fourth.

With the score tied going into the bottom of the seventh, Briery had a single, Brown singled, Morris had a double sending Briery across the plate with the winning run. Briery had a home run in the first inning for NCIS, during the four-run outbreak.

Briery finished the game with two hits, as did Brown and Morris.  
Brown came on in the seventh to pick up the win, his fourth of the year against no defeats.
