Engineering division attends annual training

CARLISLE — The 30th Engineering Division of the Kentucky National Guard spent 15 days at the Western Kentucky Training site for their annual combat and engineering training.

The Carlisle division garnered an impressive 95 percent rating during the evaluation of their performance during the two week session, Captain Edward L. Taylor said.

All Kentucky National Guard divisions were evaluated for combat readiness and an external arm evaluation in western Kentucky, Taylor said.

the training site to establish base camp operations and a perimeter. Conditions were set in a combat scenario resembling as close as possible actual conditions of warfare in a training situation, Taylor said.

Basically the Carlisle unit maintained supply lines and quell any attempts to disrupt these lines by the enemy.

The engineering divisions were confronted with various levels of combat threats, Taylor said. These combat situations involved such challenges as dealing with civil-

ian enemy sympathizers performing acts of sabotage to a full scale battle scenario where maintenance of supply lines were of crucial importance, he said.

Special service enemy impersonators from outside the Kentucky Guard would attempt to infiltrate the flank of national guard forces by parachute in an attempt to cut off supplies and sabotage the National Guard effort and possible attempts to break through base camp perimeters to wipe out guard units and harm equipment.

We took prisoners and



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went through interrogation procedures and, at times, sustained casualties. But for practical purposes, guardsmen were taken out of commission for only a limited time period, Taylor said.

It was the engineering division's duty to maintain supply lines and run missions from the base camp. They maintained 24 hour duty throughout the entire 15 day training period, feeding themselves and standing watch for enemy intruders attempting to penetrate their perimeter at any given moment.

However training remained defensive. No offensive maneuvers or training were required of the engineering units, Taylor said, although the second day of the engineering units are being part of an infantry.

Most engineering missions involved general improvements of the training site, adding turrets and jamming leads and tank ranges. After a full inventory of equipment, Taylor said the Carlisle unit has been prepared for local work in Carlisle. Soon they will be involved in assisting in the refurbishment of the old Carlisle jail house for Tourism, Inc.

James Allen Earlywine of Shannon Way, Carlisle died Monday night, July 30, 1990, following a sudden illness. He was 51.

Born July 5, 1936 in Nicholas County to the late Arthur and Grace Small Earlywine, he joined the Carlisle Police Department in July 1963, and was appointed chief in July 1987.

He attended Nicholas County High School. He was a member of the Nicholas County Fish and Game Club and a member of the Carlisle Christian Church.

He is survived by his wife, Luby (Meyner) Earlywine; a son, William Allen Earlywine at home; a daughter, Jennifer Kay Earlywine at home; two brothers, Dennis Ray Earlywine of Bourbon County and Jerry Earlywine of Carlisle; and one aunt, Miss Ruby Small of Cynthia.

Visitation will be held after 4 p.m. Wednesday at Mather's Funeral Home in Carlisle. Burial services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. at Mather's.

While there he excelled in academics and football, serving as co-captain of the football team. He was recognized as a lifetime member of the University's Varsity "D" Men sports club.

After graduation Mr. Meyer returned to Hawaii where he was responsible for surveying the island government of Molokai for the U.S. government.

During World War II he served as a civilian consultant and instructor for the U.S. Navy Seabees on the island of Maui.

His engineering credits include the designing and building of the Maui and Molokai airports, the highway Theodore and Edith Jones from West Molokai to East Molokai, the ultra-modern slaughterhouse for the Molokai Meat Company, three reservoirs, and other various projects.

Mr. Meyer was educated at the Kamehameha Schools at Honolulu, Hawaii. He was the faith-firm of Mrs. William (Karen Meyer) Anderson of 1317 Meyers Road, Carlisle, Kentucky.

He was the son of the late Edward and Edith Jones from West Molokai to East Molokai, the ultra-modern slaughterhouse for the Molokai Meat Company, three reservoirs, and other various projects.

Mr. Meyer was also responsible for the Corn Seed Research Project and served as its manager until his retirement in 1974. He was also a member of the Maui County Trooper Tom Lyanne of Lexington, with speeding, attempting to evade, no motorcycle license, and no issuer of the Missouri Federal License.
