Arnold attends meeting

State and federal issues facing the South were prime topics of discussion when state lawmakers from fifteen southern states, including Adrian K. Arnold, D-Mt. Sterling, attended the Southern Legislative Conference's 44th Annual Meeting in Asheville, July 21-26, 1990. The meeting drew over 2,000 delegates, family members and guests. Highlights of the agenda included a conference-wide address by United States Senator Charles Robb of Virginia and a session titled "The Drug Crisis in the South," featuring National Drug Policy Director Dr. William Bennett and Beban Greenberg, Chief of Police for Charleston, South Carolina. This program focused on addressing the concerns of the South, with particular emphasis on the price our nation is paying for its growing dependence on illegal drugs. The address by Marshall Turner of the U.S. Census Bureau also was timely and informative. The 1990 Conference also addressed such topics as sales tax exemptions, affordable housing, hazardous waste, long-term health care and deregulation of the transportation industry. In addition, Arnold attended the meeting of the SLC Agriculture and Rural Development Committee of which he is Assistant Under Secretary for Rural Development for the United States Department of Agriculture. Early hunting season begins

Herb Booth, Nicholas County Game Warden, said
 Booth said the second phase of squirrel season is scheduled to open on November 20 and run through December 31. Squirrel season's first phase, traditionally the opening game season for Kentucky, begins on 18 August and runs through October 31. The county's game warden said squirrels should be plentiful this year. "We had a lot of rain last year and it has brought on a real good mast crop this year," Booth said. Booth also said Clay Wildlife Management Area was a good spot for a squirrel hunt for them. "It usually has a pretty good spot for squirrels," he said. State game regulations usually no problem in the bag limit on a six-day hunting over baited fields but additional hunters may only hunt over fields that have been utilized in normal agricultural procedures.
