Independent Auditor's Report
We have audited the statements of REVENUES, DISBURSEMENTS, and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff of Nicholas County for the year ended December 31, 1989. These financial statements are the responsibility of the County Clerk and Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and the audit guide for County fiscal officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, supporting documentation for accounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The County Clerk and Sheriff prepare their financial statements on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the revenues, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 1989, in accordance with the basis of accounting described in the preceding paragraph.

As required by Government Auditing Standards, we have reported on the accuracy of the County Clerk and Sheriff's accounting procedures and compliance policies in good order. We wish to commend the County Clerk and Sheriff for their efforts and urge that similar efforts be made in the future.
