

Dogs hound Paris for All-A 10th title

PARIS - Scratching and clawing like cats, the Mayville Bulldogs captured the 10th Region All-A tournament, Saturday night. Trailing only 2-0 and then 2-1, the Bulldogs shot down a powerful outside shooting game by the Paris Greyhounds and claimed a hard fought 67-58 win.

After Travis Earlywine gave Paris the lead with 7:47 to play in the opening quarter, as Paris controlled the opening tip, Mayville's Jerome Turner knocked down three baskets in the game's first four minutes and the Bulldogs were out and running.

With 1:20 to play in the opening stanza, Alvin Sims brought the hosts to within 12-10 on a 12-foot, off-balance jumper, but Mayville's Brad Merton went strong to the offensive board and led in a follow-up shot to make it 14-10 as the first quarter ended.

Mayville dominated play early in the second quarter. With King gave Mayville its biggest lead of the first two quarters, 20-12, on a break-away layup after Orlando Myrick controlled the ball on a press-breaking steal.

Paris went back to the inside game. With Earlywine twisting and driving down the left baseline for a layup to make it 20-14, the Greyhounds brought the Paris fans to their feet as Jerry Barnes stole the ball on an inbound play, and Luke Summers drilled a 3-point hoop to make it 20-17.

The Bulldogs went to the offensive boards hard and Jerry King counted a tip in to pull Mayville ahead by three, 22-19.

The Greyhounds scratched and fought into their offensive patterns, breaking a tough Mayville press to get into their offensive set.

Using roundhouse passing, Earlywine positioned himself at the free throw line and drilled a pinpoint pass to Sims deep in the right corner, who sent home a 3-pointer to knot the score 22-22.

Two straight baskets by Merton gave the Bulldogs a 4-point lead, 26-22 with 3:05 to play in the half, but two free throws by Earlywine with 1:57 until intermission and a 6-foot driving shot by Sims tied the game for the final time, 26-26.

In the final 1:03 of the half, Mayville controlled not only the tempo but the scoring, as well. Tony Moore hit a 6-foot shot on the baseline, and Myrick canned a jumper in the lane as time expired in the half to make it 30-26 Mayville lead.

Paris opened the second half with a basket in the lane by Earlywine to cut the lead to 30-28, but Mayville ran off six unanswered points, and with 5:49 to play in the third stanza, the Bulldogs were protecting an 8-point advantage.

With 3:11 to play in the quarter, a strong move on the offensive boards by Brian Washington for Paris, who tipped four straight times before getting the ball to fall, gave the Greyhounds a glimmer of hope. The inside basket cut the Mayville lead to 36-35.

Mayville pushed its lead back to eight with 24 seconds to play in the quarter as Turner canned two free throws.

A driving layup straight down the lane by Sims with seven seconds left in the quarter cut the Mayville lead to 45-39 going into the final eight minutes.

The third quarter showed a noticeable lack of 3-point baskets by Paris, while Mayville's Jerry King converted on his only attempt.

Mayville Coach Doug Hines said he had planned it that way.

I told the kids before the game we had to make them (Paris) more (from pressure) when taking their outside shots. I told them if we were able to do that we would be able to take those shots away and take them out of their high-scoring game."

Earlywine kept Paris in the game with four points in the first minute and a half of the final quarter, and with 6:32 left in the game, the Greyhounds were within two, 47-45.

The next two minutes sealed the doom for the home-standing Greyhounds.

With Mayville unable to convert on four straight trips down the floor, twice losing the ball to turnovers, Paris was unable to get the ball to fall on two close in shots, including two from 3-point range.

With 3:40 left in the game, Myrick dropped in a 6-foot shot from the left baseline, and the Bulldogs stopped the Paris offense with steals in back court, to hold onto a 52-45 advantage.

The Bulldogs continued to hold the lead and, in fact, extended the lead to 10 points on two occasions and 13 points, 60-47 with 1:07 to play, ending the Greyhounds' hopes of a trip to Lexington and the All-A State Championship Feb. 7-10 in Memorial Coliseum.

Hines said he felt certain his bench came into play as a big factor in the Bulldogs' win.

"We were able to play our sixth, seventh and eighth men early and get our starters some rest for the run down the stretch," Hines said, as his players were receiving the championship trophy.

"The rested players also allowed us to put more pressure on the ball," he added.

Bob Eades, head coach of Paris, showed little disappointment in the play of his team.

"I told our players we had to rest and make adjustments. I knew we would get pressure - we had to react - and we didn't at times."

"We got the ball inside. We did our best to execute. We just weren't able to finish off our offense the way we wanted."

Eades pointed to the second half drought as a key in the loss.

"We weren't able to hit the basket down the stretch. We had six or eight chances to make the big play and couldn't."

"We played hard - we just couldn't get it to go in. I know we have a team of hard workers."

Mayville took advantage of the charity line hitting 19 of 27 for 70 percent, while Paris was just six of 14 for a cool 43 percent.

Earlywine led Paris, now 12-9, and all scorers with 27 points.

Mayville, which improved to 16-5, had three players in double figures, as Turner had 25, Jerry King had 12, and Merton had 11.

Mayville will battle Mayfield in the All-A State Tournament's afternoon session beginning at 2:30 p.m.
