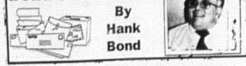

Published this week is the reproduction, photographically of the oldest copy of The Carlisle Mercury in possession (Jan. 7, 1873). Headlines: "Terrible Fire at Carlisle, Ten Buildings in Ruins."

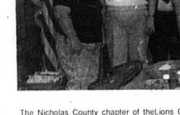

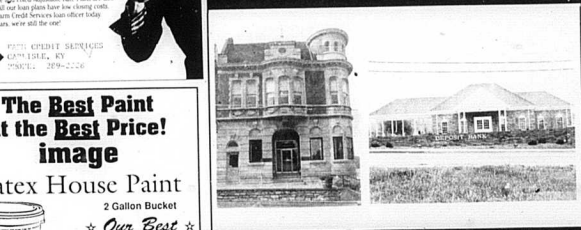
