Chalfoux said he has no ties to any place, but his family roots in Carlisle and his visit is the first time he has been to Carlisle in 30 years. He said he travels about 22 miles a day, while riding "roughing it" by making "camping" when he has time or eating in a restaurant where he has money. "I see how money corrupts people and I am not in a hurry and I am going to travel and see things," he said. He said he is on a trip that started in Missouri and will lead him to Vermont for his sister's wedding. While in Vermont he will see his parents for the first time in 25 years.

Lady Jackets to compete in AAU

The Nicholas County Lady Jackets have been invited to play in the AAU girls 16 and Under State Tournament in Frankfort June 7-9. The Lady Jackets, based on head coach Barbara Kenney's estimation of her team's performance in the regular high school basketball season, registered for the tournament. Because the teams limit themselves to players 16 years old and under, Kenney could use her starting team. The only players not eligible to play is graduated senior Christa Auster and rising senior Amy Simons. Eight high school girls' basketball teams in the state have accepted the invitation. Clinton County, Garrard County, Nicholas County, Salvation Army, Adair County, Madison Southern, Mercer County, Southern, and the Frankfort team, split into A and B teams for tournament purposes. The girls will be playing a best of four tournament beginning Thursday, June 7 at the Frankfort High School and Second Street Gyms at 12:30. The Lady Jackets, who play two games on Thursday and Friday, kick off the tournament in the Second Street gym against Clinton County. Friday, June 8, the Lady Jackets are pitted against the Salvation Army girls' team at 3:30 p.m. and at 6:30 p.m. against Clinton County. Saturday, June 9, a championship elimination round will determine the final four place winners in the tournament in the Second Street gym. Thursday's second game for the Jackets begins at 4 p.m. in the Frankfort gym against Garrard County.
