NCHS diamondmen win three, lose one, now 17-7

Nicholas County's baseball team saw its record wind up at 17-7 through 26th this week, winning three and losing one.

The Jackets scored three times in the second inning to lead Mason County 3-0. The Royals scored one in the fourth, fifth and sixth to knot the score.

The Jackets went ahead 5-3 with two runs in the top half of the seventh inning, but the homecoming Royals sent two across the plate in the bottom of the last inning to claim a 6-5 win.

Brian Hilderer (1-1) came on in relief of David Shert and took the loss. Head Brerly had three hits and Robert two to pare Nicholas County.

Nicholas County traveled to Falmouth to take on the Wildcat of Pendleton County and claimed a 9-5 victory to begin a three game winning streak.
