State Police urge seatbelt, seat use

Highway safety is a subject many people may be tired of hearing about, but the Kentucky State Police want to help save your life. It is estimated that you have a 40 to 50 percent better chance of surviving a fatal car crash if you wear a seatbelt. Meaningless statistic you say, absolutely not, especially for the 50,000 families that have loved ones each year who die in traffic crashes. Vehicle crashes are the leading trauma related cause of spinal cord injuries, epilepsy, and mental retardation, and the current nationwide economic losses resulting from traffic crashes exceed \$24 billion each year.

May 21 through May 28 has been designated as Buckle Up America Week and this year's goal is to increase the correct use of safety belts and child safety seats, and to expand public awareness of how automatic crash protection systems work, i.e. air bags. We are going into the deadliest time of the year and most of those deaths could be prevented," so said Captain Fields said. "The best way to keep the child in their seat is to lead by example, in other words the parents should also be safely buckled up. When you consider the car crash is the number one killer of people from birth through 24 years of age the national Buckle Up America Week habit is a habit you can live with. Start today!"
