Rebecca Crawford and Craig Jones have been awarded the national I Dare You Leadership Award in recognition of personal integrity, balanced living, and potential for leadership. The honor was presented at ceremonies held at Nicholas County High School.

The I Dare You Leadership Award is made available each year by the American Youth Foundation in cooperation with Principals, Headmasters and 4-H County Agents across the country.

The Award was first offered in 1941 by William H. Danforth, founder of the Balston Purina company in St. Louis, who dared young people to achieve their highest potential and to influence others through lives of service.

The Award takes its name from the book, I Dare You, written by Mr. Danforth, in which he commends the balance of mind, body, and spirit and development as the backbone of leadership.

In addition to a Certificate of Recognition, Crawford and Jones receive a copy of Danforth's inspirational book, I Dare You, and a scholarship opportunity to attend the American Youth Foundation's National Leadership Conference at Camp Merrimack in New Hampshire, over 8,000 schools and 4-H programs participate in the I Dare You Leadership Award each year.

The Community Action Council announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture surplus commodities including flour, meal, bean, peanut butter, honey, and pork will be distributed to eligible area residents. Amounts allocated vary according to household size. Foods and amount may be adjusted depending upon availability.

The foods will be distributed at the Community Action Council, 124 West Main Street on Wednesday, June 6, 1990 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. community Action, 149 Scrub Grass Road will distribute Thursday, June 7, 1990 from 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Misrepresentation of need, or exchange of USDA commodities is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible households.
