Industrial Authority receives office

 When area merchants first gathered to form the Carlisle-Nicholas County Industrial Authority in 1986, one of its primary goals was to establish a central area with a regular employee to help coordinate and provide information for potential business interests.

Four years later, the Industrial Authority realized this goal, establishing its first office on Locust Street below the main branch of Depue Park of Carlisle with furnishings donated from First National Bank.

New Industrial Authority executive director Spud Marshall, who has been hired in a part-time capacity, said the good fortunes they have received have been quite moving.

Every county that has established an industrial authority has recognized the need for a private, centralized location. The authority provides any

type of information a potential industry may need to consider providing in the area and the authority as well as other officials to meet.

Though the question of confidentiality may be infuriating to industry members find that what is going on for future industrial hopes for the county, degree of secrecy is imperative to their success, Marshall said.

"No business will even talk deal unless they can be assured of a certain degree of confidence," Marshall said. Not necessarily as protection from rival industry, most businesses want discretion because of the potential risks that can result from what goes on, he said.

Suddenly the cost of property skyrocketed in the location they desire and the deal falls through and the potential of industrial prospects in the way of more available jobs gets crushed, he said.

However, he said, the benefits of an industrial authority will always have the pressure of keeping to hear, he said. There exist those who do not believe Nicholas County or even Carlisle have much to offer industry, a belief the authority members find that untrue and a serious mistake to assume.

In addition to the location incentives they can offer is the fact that Nicholas County is predominantly non-union with a solid labor force available for employment. Another is the wide availability of sewer and water services, a point which only a short time ago was not a county bargaining chip.

"Because of construction moratoriums the federal government had placed on Carlisle until the sewer and water plants were improved, our hands were tied as to what we could physically offer in industrial projects in the way of some basic services."

AN ORDINANCE Relating to the Annual Budget and Amendment Thereof.

WHEREAS the County of Nicholas has received unadopted revenues;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF NICHOLAS COUNTY THAT:

SECTION ONE. The annual budget for fiscal year 1991 is amended to:
