Cowan officials to be on lookout, Tuesday

With a U.S. Senate race, school board contests, legislative elections, and heated local ballot issues, there is, unfortunately, a high potential for vote fraud activity during the upcoming November 6 election," according to Attorney General Fred Cowan.

To prevent as much illegal activity as possible, investigative teams from the Attorney General's Office will again visit polling places throughout the state on election day. "Although we like to keep the bad guys guessing and not disclose exactly where we'll be, it's safe to say that we will have more investigators in more places than in any election since the reform laws of 1988 went into effect," Cowan says.

In addition, vote fraud will be targeted at the federal level as well, Cowan says. Joseph M. Whittle, United States Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky, Louisville, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky, and Terry O'Connor, Special Agent in Charge of the Louisville Field Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, have announced that their agencies will be closely coordinating with the election fraud efforts of the Attorney General's Office in the coming election.

Cowan urged decisions on where to place the Attorney General's monitoring teams were made in response to calls and written requests from citizens and local officials, the need to have a statewide presence, and based on knowledge of certain "hot spot" areas where the potential for election violations is high. In conjunction with the monitoring teams, the Election Fraud Hotline will also be available for citizens to report any suspected violations.

The Hotline, which was established as part of the election reform laws passed by the 1988 General Assembly, says his office has revised and is sending out the Manual to voting precinct officials statewide.
