Gulf Crisis means more tough times ahead for farmers

Farmers, still reeling from hard times in the mid 80s, should brace themselves for another onslaught of financial problems.  
 The Persian Gulf crisis which has sent light crude prices doubling in a little over two months, will mean that farmers throughout the U.S. will pay from 25 to 35 percent more for just their crops in come next spring, unless the conflict is resolved, according to a University of Kentucky agricultural economist.  
 "The doubling of light crude prices is being felt by farmers, whose fuel use includes not just what they put in their tractors, but also in the myriad of fertilizers and chemicals they use on their crops," said Forrest Stegelm, an agricultural economist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"The double whammy that likely will accompany higher oil prices, and which may impact some livestock farmers over the financial precipice, includes sharply lower government price supports and cash payments anticipated as an outgrowth of federal budget balancing."  
 "Although we don't exactly know how Congress will make cuts to balance the federal budget, we can guess pretty well that many of them will be in farm programs," Stegelm said.

Morehead stuns top ranked Eastern

 RICHMOND - Nearly two decades of frustration came to an end Saturday afternoon as Morehead State upset Eastern Kentucky, 27-17, at Roy Kidd Stadium.  
 Trailing 17-7 entering the fourth quarter, the Eagles stormed back behind the passing of senior quarterback Chris Swartz. The running of Jerome Williams and the catching and running of sophomore Brandon Ford.  
 The win was the first Morehead victory in 18 years over archrival Eastern.  
 The Morehead rally actually began late in the third quarter.  
 Morehead had fallen behind 17-7 on a field goal by Eastern kicker Todd Duffy.  
 The Eagles received the kick off and returned the ball to the EKU 24.  
 With 2:28 left in the third quarter, Jerome Williams ran off right tackle for a gain of 14 yards. The fifty run was followed by a short Williams run and an Eastern sack of Swartz for minus six yards.  
 Facing third down and 14, Swartz found Brandon Ford for a 23 yard pick up to the Eastern 42 yard line.  
 The Morehead signal-caller found Ford again on the next play.  
 With time coming to an end in the third quarter, Ford caught the ball and rumbled eight more yards.  
 The opening of the fourth quarter saw Morehead go to the air again.  
 Facing second and two on the Eastern 34, Swartz hooked up with David Pingo for 15 more yards. The completion moved the ball to the Eastern 19 yard line.  
 On the next play, Swartz completed a pass to Williams. The speedy halfback caught the ball and ran into the end zone untouched.  
 Morehead coach Cole Proctor decided to go for two points, much to the surprise of the 13,000 fans. A Swartz pass fell incomplete and Morehead trailed 17-13 with 1:47 left in the game.  
 Eastern's Reggie McGee received the Morehead kick off on the 14. The Eastern defensive back squirmed forward for 14 yards and ran out of bounds.  
 Several Morehead players tackled McGee out of bounds. A small scuffle broke out on the Eastern sideline.  
 Morehead's overpursuit of the return cut the Eagles' dead.  
 The referees consulted and hit the visitors with two penalties for a total of 30 yards. Morehead received 15 yards for a late hit and 15 more yards for unsportsmanlike conduct.  
 The combined penalties moved the ball from the Eastern 29 to the Morehead 42. Eastern fullback William Smith burst through the Morehead defense on first down to pick up eight yards.  
 Another Smith run picked up eight more yards and gave Eastern a first down at the Morehead 48.  
 A holding penalty pushed the Carlisle back 10 yards.  
 Facing first and 20, Eastern went to the air unsuccessfully.  
 On second and 20, the Morehead defense struck. Eastern quarterback Jerry Crenshaw dropped back to pass but was hurried by linebacker Tom Cohen for a six yard loss. It was the fifth "back of the day" for the Eagle defense, who would get one more before the day was finished.  
 The critical play of the day occurred on the next snap. Crenshaw dropped back and found fullback Lane Brown, who ran the right flat at the 45 yard line.  
 Brown slashed through the

The yardage was stopped off and Morehead faced first and 25 from their own 36 yard line.  
 The Eagles bounced back on the first play after the snafu.  
 Swartz went to Ford for the third straight time. Ford caught the ball in a seam of Eastern's zone and was run out of bounds on the Eastern 12 yard line.  
 The play picked up 52 yards and the Eagles were knocking on the door with 8:41 left on the clock.  
 A Swartz pass was incomplete on first down but Williams was able to find a gap and pick up nine yards.  
 A third down rush by Williams was stopped inches short of the first down at the three yard line. Morehead then called timeout.  
 After speaking with Swartz and his offensive coordinator, Proctor decided against a field goal attempt and went for first down.  
 Swartz took the snap. Instead of handing off, though, the 63 senior rolled to his right and threw for the end zone.  
 The ball was just out of reach of receiver David Pingo, who dove but was unable to catch the ball.  
 The home crowd breathed a collective sigh of relief. But the relief would be short-lived for Eastern. Cash on the sunny Saturday.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT

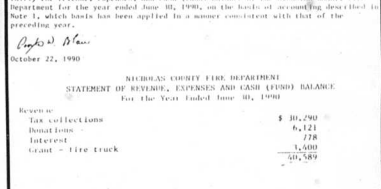
Note 1 - Accounting Policy

Morehead stuns top ranked Eastern

On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Crenshaw and center Jim Vanlander had trouble with the exchange and a fumble was the result. It was the seventh fumble of the game for the Carlisle and the third they would lose.  
 Morehead took control on the four yard line. Williams took a handoff from Swartz and scored immediately on a four yard run over the left side.  
 The point after was good and Morehead led for the first time, 20-17, with 7:15 to go in the game.  
 Eastern received the kick-off and returned the ball to its 26 yard line. The Colonel of offense was shut down by the swarming gold and white defense and was forced to punt after three plays.  
 Morehead's Anthony White gathered the punt in and returned it straight up the field. Two completions by Crenshaw put the ball in Morehead territory, but an interception by linebacker Tom Cohen ended the drive with 11 ticks left on the clock.  
 Morehead then ran the score out and swarmed into the field to celebrate their first victory over Eastern in 18 years.  
 Swartz, playing in his final college game, missed the game plan to perfection in the fourth quarter, mixing pass and run. The Morehead offense scored 20 points against Eastern as Swartz finished with 28 completions in 41 attempts for 344 yards.  
 Eastern attempted to drive the ball. Two completions by Crenshaw put the ball in Morehead territory, but an interception by linebacker Tom Cohen ended the drive with 11 ticks left on the clock.
