GENERAL NEWS

For District Judges Wells, McGee attend meeting

A review and update on search and seizure cases, and procedures for issuing warrants was offered by Lexington District Judge Kevin Horan. Professor Louise Graham, University of Kentucky College of Law, instructed the 107 judges in attendance on potentially prejudicial and the use of federally mandated Child Support Guidelines to determine appropriate amounts in ordering child support.

New guardianship laws enacted by the legislature and requirements for the submission of disability guardianship financial reports were discussed by District Judges Stan Billingsley, Carrollton, and Thomas Merrill, Louisville.

Two nationally recognized law-related psychiatrists examine the personal and professional circumstances which affect judicial performance. Dr. Andrew Watson, professor of law and professor of psychiatry (retired) from the University of Michigan, discussed various factors which psychologically influence a judge's decision-making process, such as the public's expectation of judicial wisdom, reelection prospects, possible reversal by an appellate court, overcrowded dockets, and the limits and inadequacies of sentencing alternatives, among other things.

Dr. Isaiah Zimmerman, Washington, D.C., helped the judges understand the reasons for judicial emotional stress, how to determine whether they are experiencing burnout, and the methods they should employ to cope with the intense and relentless pressures and demands of dealing with society's troubles.

What Jesus Taught

Is the use of an instrument of music in Christian worship just a "holy matter"? Some people think it strange that anyone would think that. It is wrong to think of musical instruments of music in the church as "holy matters" which were on earth it would have been just an instrument for one to have used that instrument ought to be used in worship.

"The way that one should have genuine interest in people is by being the truth of God's word. Paul said, 'Am I desirous to become your enemy because I will you the truth?' Gal. 4:16. Jesus said, 'You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free.' (John 8:32)

What people think and do is not the standard by which we can determine whether a practice is right or wrong. What is important and do in religion is not the standard by which we can determine whether instruments of music should be or should not be used. The word of God is our standard, by it alone can a student of the Bible determine what God wants in worship!

Jesus, the Son of God, pointed out to the Pharisees (the most popular religious people of His day) that their worship was vain (empty) because they practiced things that were human traditions. He said, 'Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men. For laying aside the commandment of God, ye hold the traditions of men, as the washing of pots and cups, and many other such like things ye do. And he said unto them, Full will ye reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition.' (Mark 7:9-13)

Please observe that the practices that made their worship vain in God's sight were "little things." Some seem to insist that instruments of music are "holy matters" that we should not be disturbed over their use. But, the Word of God, dear reader, there are not any "holy matters" when it comes to respecting His word and the authority he has vested in His Son, Jesus the Christ. God knew just what he wanted in His worship. Jesus taught much about worship. He said nothing about the use of instruments of music. He speaks nothing about them. The early church did not use them.
