MSU falls to Samford, 25-22

MIDDLEBURY - Big numbers didn't win games.

Almost absent count, except in blowing of tractor horns.
Clare, but no vigor.

Slake hit and hitting Morehead State gave a 14-3 halftime lead, used the game at 22-22 in the last quarter, only to lose 25-22 to Samford University Saturday.

Although the Eagles had over 44 yards in total offense, so did Samford, and Morehead dropped to 3-2 on the season with the loss, while MSU's Jerome Williams became the school's all-time reception leader.

Morehead moved the length of the field on its first possession of the game.
Starting at the Eagles' 32, Morehead used just three plays, keyed 60 yards rushing and a 16 yard reception from Williams to score on the first possession on a one yard run by Chris Swartz.

Swartz, the Bath County native, a wide receiver, had a 100 yard rushing career in the season.
Williams had seven receptions the game, three more than he scored to set a new school mark.

Williams now has 153, leading the 152 mark held by Mark Leasing (1981-83).
After the MSU score, Craig Broer took on the career, and MSU led 7-0 with 10:27 to play in the first quarter.

Morehead missed an opportunity to extend its lead when a 26 yard field goal attempt by Broer was wide to the left.
Samford quarterback Ted Darby led his Bulldogs deep into Morehead territory, but after completing a 63 yard pass to Ed Smith, a devastating tackle by Darrell Braxton, who finished with nine tackles in the game, knocked the ball back.

Morehead along safety Mike Tumor jumped on the lone pigskin and Morehead had stopped the Bulldogs.
After a couple possession changes, Samford mounted a long drive beginning at the Bulldogs' 19.

Driving 64 yards in 11 plays the Eagles did not respond. Samford's Michael O'Neal, a tight end, led the MSU lead to 7-0.
O'Neal's kick cleared the way for more than 20 yards, a strong noise to the Eagles, but kicking form would be deadly.

After MSU turned the ball over following a short drive, Samford could move very little, and the Bulldogs punned from their own 26.
Anthony White took the ball and returned it 17 yards to the Samford 42.

Swartz hit Dave Pingue with a 14 yard completion and a first down at the Samford 28.
On the very next play, Swartz connected with Pingue in the right

corner of the end zone for a touch-down and the head pumper at the end.
Here kicked on the extra point.
Morehead's lead increased to a wide margin of 14-3.

O'Neal missed a 44 yard field goal attempt on time, expired an interception.
Eagles' father in second half.
"We used to tell them (the MSU players) we should have to play a strong second half to win," MSU Coach Cole Proctor said after the game.

Morehead's offense continued to struggle, while the Bulldogs' Darby hit Jones from 11 yards out, and with O'Neal's extra point kick, Morehead trailed 22-6.

During a very important fourth quarter drive, the hand signal got into the crowd and filled the stadium with the MSU fight song, and Proctor turned toward the stands and quiet on support.
Loudly and loudly the crowd yanked cheering spectators offered a very different light to the Morehead fans' faithful atmosphere.

The effect obviously worked for the Eagles.
Morehead came right back.
The Eagles covered 69 yards in four plays and a minute and 16 seconds, keyed by Swartz passing including a 12 yard pass for the touchdown to Pingue. A two point conversion pass to Brandon Ford from Swartz knotted the score at 22-6.

There was 13:11 left to play in the game.
Samford stalled at the Morehead 30. The Eagles could get no yardage and field goal to tie the Samford 6.
A 10 yard sack on Darby forced the Bulldogs to punt from their own 36.

Although White returned the ball nine yards to the Morehead 18.
The Eagles had moved to the 20 before Swartz's pass was intercepted and returned to the Eagles' 23.
Samford drove to the MSU nine, but could not score a touchdown.
O'Neal would prove to be the hero for Samford with a 27 yard field goal with 2:50 to play in the game.
