OUR HERITAGE

Benjamin Franklin

Benjamin Franklin was one of the 18th century's most famous and innovative Americans. Many Americans are familiar with his role as a patriotic founding father, espousing the power of democracy and the will of the people. But Franklin also was a philosopher, educator, statesman and inventor.

From the 10th of 17 children in Boston, Mass., on Jan. 17, 1706, Franklin was a quick learner. His formal education ended at age 10 with one year of grammar school and another under a private teacher. From there on he educated himself through intense reading. At age 12, he became an apprentice bookbinder in his father's shop. He later mastered the trade as a self-taught bookbinder. He had authored such famous works as "Poor Richard's Almanac" and "Plain Truth."

Franklin also had a fascination with weather and science that led him to perform many innovative experiments — some successful, others less so. In fact, he nearly electrocuted himself trying to cook a Christmas turkey with the current from his newly invented lightning rod. However, it is uncertain that he actually performed the experiment most often attributed to him — flying a kite as a thunderstorm brewed. The distinction between lightning and electricity.

In recognition of his understanding of electricity, Franklin was selected to some of the most prominent academies in Paris and London. In fact, some of the terms he used in reference to electricity — "positive," "negative," "battery" and "conductor" — are still used today. As one biographer wrote, "Franklin found electricity a curiosity and left it a science."

Some of Franklin's other inventions came as a result of an inability to accept things as they were. For example, he got tired of changing from one pair of spectacles to another, so he cut the frames and put the different lenses together in the same case, which we know as bifocals.

With the Philadelphia Club of the Leathersmiths, Franklin organized the first volunteer fire company and founded the first fire insurance company. In fact, he was so successful as a promoter that his good ideas were often sought to help. However, that didn't always ensure a success. When the time came to select a national bird, Franklin proposed the turkey. He was overruled, with the bald eagle the victor.

Pointers For Parents

Child Self Esteem: Parents' No. 1 Concern
A recent survey of 600 U.S. parents conducted by The Independent Order of Foresters revealed that their first concern in their children's education was to help them develop self-esteem. Most parents want their children to lead happy and productive lives, and a great self-esteem program can help them do that.

Many of the common, most frequent problems faced by most parents today—like drug and alcohol abuse, sexual promiscuity, eating disorders, suicide and delinquency—are directly linked to a poor self-esteem and low self-confidence.

How can concerned parents have a positive influence on a child's self-esteem? Here are some well-tested approaches offered by experts in the field of parent education.

1. BE POSITIVE. Use humor and imagination and your children will learn to be more hopeful. Encourage what is good about the child or the situation. Have faith in your children as they may believe in themselves. Let your children know their worth. Encourage improvement and effort, not just accomplishment.

2. BE GENEROUS WITH WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT. "I like the way you handled that." "I appreciate what you did."

3. ALLOW CHILDREN TO TAKE MEANINGFUL ROLES AND SHARE RESPONSIBILITIES. A child is the parent's partner or friend, not a passive beneficiary of parents' approval and disapproval.

4. LEARN TO LISTEN AND TALK WITH CHILDREN IN WAYS THAT ENCOURAGE OPEN COMMUNICATION. Use the dinner hour or a weekly meeting to have a family show and tell time or a conversation in which family members share why they like themselves, or what their goals are.

5. IDENTIFY AND SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT OF INDIVIDUAL TALENTS AND INTERESTS IN YOUR FAMILY. Reduce the influence of television and encourage family participation in organized games, clubs, leisure reading, puzzles and parties, arts and crafts, hobbies or volunteer work.
