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County-wide trash pickup, one step closer

CARLISLE — Nicholas County Fiscal Court is one step closer to a county-wide trash collection policy after its first reading of a solid waste management ordinance.

Mike Morgan, of Bluegrass Area Development, presented the court a sketch of an ordinance that is recommended by the state.

Senate Bill 2, passed during the last Special Session of the Kentucky General Assembly, set guidelines for county governments to follow in setting up a waste management policy.

The plan must be received by the state by June 1. The county must pass an ordinance providing universal access to trash collection.

The court discussed several options for trash collection, including contracting garbage collection to a private company.

The ordinance defines waste management terms, sets restrictions on hazardous waste, and guidelines on trash disposal.

The second reading of the ordinance will be on May 14 at 9 a.m.

The court will review a

contract proposal from the Bluegrass Area Development to aid the county in setting its

policy and putting it into effect. The total cost will be \$8000.

But the court will be responsible for only \$3000; state grants will pay the difference.

Escapee caught after flight from courthouse

CARLISLE — A Carlisle man has been charged with third degree escape following a 1 p.m. run to freedom, Monday.

Michael L. Jolly, 22, Hickory Ridge Road, Carlisle fled from Nicholas County Deputy Jailer Dick Garrett, while the men were going to court during a recess from Nicholas District Court.

Jolly was in court, Monday, to face charges stemming from his arrest by Carlisle Police Officer Terry W. Fryman.

Jolly had been charged at 3:30 p.m. April 11, with alcohol intoxication, disorderly conduct, resisting arrest and third degree escape.

According to a Police report filed by Fryman, Jolly had to be physically removed from a

home on Spring Street, last Thursday.

When Jolly reached the police station, following the arrest, he began to run from police and was finally apprehended, a second time, behind Southern States.

Monday, while Jolly was being removed from the courthouse he ran from Deputy Jailer Dick Garrett, but was recaptured a few

minutes later near Spring and Walnut streets.

Also going chase were Nicholas County Jailer George Garrett, Carlisle Police officers Brent Wade, Gary Salter and David Hardin. Kentucky State Police Trooper Tim Layne also assisted with the apprehension.

Jolly was taken to Bourbon County Jail in Paris, following his arrest by Dick Garrett.

Nicholas County Judge Executive Bruce Smoot said the city will help pay for the plan.

The ordinance named Smoot as the county's solid waste coordinator.

In other business, the court voted to purge delinquent school bills through court action. Nicholas County Attorney Jack Conley will send out

letters setting up a court date heard from Jim Galbraith, representing the Nicholas County Little League, about the need of the old army building on East Main Street as a practice facility.

The Nicholas County Extension Service had also expressed an interest in the facilities.
