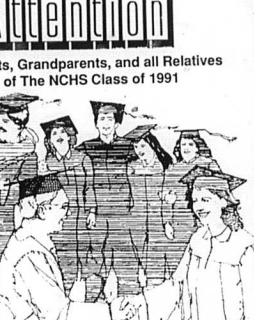

The resignations were an-
nounced moments after the
court had served as an open
forum for water district cus-
tomers to air their com-
plaints.

More than 20 customers ap-
peared before the court and
complained of the high cost of
water line installation as
compared to the original es-
timates, and the length of time
to install new water lines.

Watkins said his resigna-
tion would take effect after the
completion of three projects
currently under construction.

Selvaige's resignation will
go into effect on June 1.

Several members of the
court expressed concern of the
long range cost for the total
administration of the water
district.

Watkins said he has
served the district at \$10,000
per year on out of pocket ex-
penses.

The court members were
concerned that the cost of ad-
ministration and office ex-

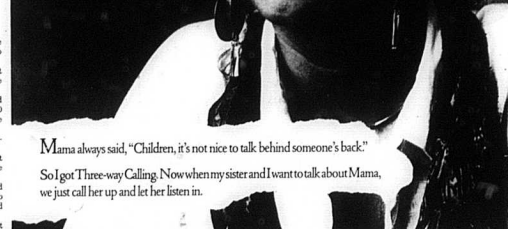
