

# Family resource center gives help

One of the most significant changes occurring within Kentucky School Reform is the recognition that there are situations in any student's life that can affect their ability to learn.

Students need to know where to go for help and where they can receive the aid they need. This is the basic idea behind the creation of the Nicholas County Family Resource and Youth Services Center located in the first trailer behind the elementary school.

The entire purpose of the program is to provide information and advice. No stu-

dent should have to enter school doors involved in a situation that impairs their learning," Charles Canupp, Resource Center Administrator, said.

However, Canupp said, this program is not solely for students. Parents, in fact any Nicholas County, can avail themselves of the resources and information the center offers.

The center also gives parents an exceptional way to get involved with the community, Canupp said.

To govern the activities and program offerings the resource center will have, Canupp said a Fundamental Advisory Council will be

established to function like an executive board.

The council, basically, will advise or present the school board with its recommendations for the kind of programs and material will offer in the center," Canupp said. This council, as specifically stated in the funding application all schools must prepare before being able to set up a program and receive state funding for a program, calls for an organization of nine members consisting of the following besides Canupp.

One school administrator must stand on council, which in this case is High School Vice-Principal Ron Baker,

one teacher from the elementary and high school, each guidance counselor, and two students and two parents from each school.

The resource center is not designed to provide programs, Canupp said. However, it rather to provide an information center in which all county residents and students can get help with matters such as drug and alcohol abuse, family matters, and problems of mental health and stability.

All parents will be asked to give their permission for the resource center to provide these materials for their child, should the need arise, Canupp said.

"Our responsibility is to aid people in our county with problems. By its very nature, our service is entirely confidential. We give people information on where to get help for potentially damaging problems as conveniently as possible," Canupp said.

The program designed specifically for and run by Nicholas County people, Canupp said. Besides himself, Marsha Livingood will also serve as an aid and provider for the program.

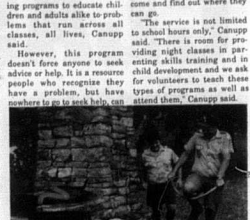
