purpose to be covered while they work on the baseball field.
To adopt the following statement: "The Nicholas County Board of Education has determined its approved facility plan in effect on June, 1991, is grossly inconsistent with the administrative regulations governing the development of the plan because the plan does not include facilities necessary to implement programs mandated by H.B. 940. It is requested that time extension beyond June 30, 1991, be granted and the Department complete a new facility survey to correct this inconsistency."
The plan was adopted on June 28, 1991 but the state board did not meet until July 3, 1991 so it will just certify the qualification of the commission.
The board approved three change orders for the Nicholas County Elementary Renovation project for a total of \$75,781.80.
The change order will be used to fix the wood trim at a cost of \$20,118.50, arrange counter tops at \$4,940 and a new water fountain for \$67.25. Also to repair what the fountain leaks, putting the tile in restrooms, fixing the starwells, two work rooms downstairs, and Mrs. Lottis O'Bannon room.
There will be \$3,596.93 left from the original amount of money for the elementary project.

Complaints made
A flyer, which several members of the City Council produced announcing the \$30 rate, was mistakenly labeled to a 55 percent share as viewers have changed their own cable hook-ups in Carlisle.
"More and more new television programs and being produced on cable channels and in the cost of carrying the programs have also jumped. The two dollar swing will set the monthly rate for basic cable service from \$15.95 to \$17.95."
The increase, Hardy explained, was to compensate for the increase in fees to keep major cable networks such as ESPN and TNT on the Simmons' channel lineup.
Therefore, the three major networks, ABC, CBS, and NBC, commanded 87 percent of the viewer ratings, Hardy explained. The technical difficulties experienced by

carrying their cable channels 31 channels from which to choose as opposed to Cable 21.
Hardy explained some advantages to fewer channels, was of poor quality and that expanded basic cable, most are duplicate network channels that they have two NBC, CBS, and ABC stations.
