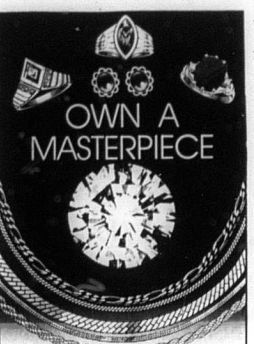

Council, district to seek water resolution

By Hank Bond The Carlisle Mercury Staff CARLSLE — No settlement was reached on a water problem at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Simons, Myers Road, during a special meeting of Carlisle's Council, Wednesday night.

On hand for the meeting was Charles Watkins, who as the Nicholas County Water District, the Simons and five of six Carlisle Council members.

Sharon Faulconer was absent from the meeting. Carlisle Mayor Frankie Hughes called the meeting to order in an effort to resolve problems with water service for the Simons family. In a 1988 agreement with the City of Carlisle, the city must furnish the Simons family with pure water, although the city must haul the water to do so.

The agreement calls for the providing of water in exchange for an easement the Nicholas County Water District would extend the line to the Simons' property, once a City line had been completed to Kennedy Heights.

The new line, which has been completed for more than a year, was put in place to offer more pressure to the Nicholas County Water District's service.

Watkins told the council his best estimate was this line would cost \$18,000 to \$18,000 with the possibility of a somewhat lower cost, which would be determined by the availability of manpower, etc.

During the past three years several letters have been exchanged on the matter with Carlisle City Attorney Skip Watson, Simons and Watkins.

There is no contract between the water district and the city, signed for the water district. Watkins' told council he could not sign a three party agreement as representative of the district.

Carlisle City Superintendent Gayle Vandanaugh said he remembered the original agreement, and the meeting which spurred that agreement, but does not recall any mention of a cost to Simons.

The meeting ended without concrete direction, with the city fathers agreeing the contract between Simons and Watkins is still valid, and Watkins said he would investigate alternatives to the possibility of supplying the water to the district.

Council will hold its regular session, Monday, February 11 beginning at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall.

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Sales big concern for merchants

By Susan L. Hoising The Carlisle Mercury Staff CARLSLE — Sales were the biggest concern of the merchants at the January Business After 5 meeting.

Carlisle has struggled with various projects to encourage and keep small businesses in the service of its citizens. As part of the Main Street Program, The First National Bank and The Deposit Bank of Carlisle have offered loans at low interest rates.

These were in the form of SBA and other government funded projects, and were not as successful as the banks would have liked.

The main reason both banks participated in these low interest loans programs through Main Street was to encourage participation in the project, according to Lanny Hutchison, President of The First National Bank of Carlisle.

Approximately \$750,000 worth of commercial, non-agricultural loans, were still outstanding at the close of 1990.

This included loans to existing businesses for expansion, repairs, etc. When asked at the meeting about the possibility of small interest loans being secured, he said each individual circumstance would be reviewed, and if all the factors were good for the community, and consider the loan would be presented.

Upon questioning, Greg Wills, Executive Vice-President and Mr. Tom Orker, Branch Manager of the Carlisle office of the Deposit Bank of Carlisle, said Wills concluded, "We experienced loan growth of over \$2 million dollars as of the close of 1990, of which many of the loans were to service small businesses."

In 1991, The Deposit Bank will begin going space to accommodate the changes of Commerce, which will be located in The Carlisle, Nicholas County Industrial Arts Building," Wills said.

Some discussion ensued concerning the possibility Nicholas Fiscal Court may be able to purchase the building.

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
