## Lady Jackets end regular season with 91-32 victory

**CARLISLE** - The Nicholas County Lady Bluejackets rolled over the Saint Patrick Lady Saints 91-32 in the last game of the regular season.

The win improved the Lady Jackets' record to 21-5. Nicholas County dedicated the game to senior Amy Simons. Simons was honored in a tearful half-time ceremony and responded with 11 points for the game.

Nicholas County got the game out of reach early on. The Saints were pressured and hurried by the Jackets' press, and the Nicholas County offense got rolling in the first quarter.

After just five minutes of play, the Lady Jackets had rolled up a 18-2 lead. Jennifer Shumacher added a layup for the Saints, but Simons started a 9-0 spurt to close the first period.

Nikki Smoot and Elizabeth Schanding led the charge with a streak of steals that led to easy layups. When the first period ended, Nicholas County held a commanding 25-7 lead.

Tacy Earlywine continued the run in the second quarter. After a Saint Patrick score, Earlywine scored the next six points of the game.

Nicholas County led 31-9 at the 5:45 mark. After Shumacher hit a free throw, neither team could score for the next 3:00. Turnovers and steals dominated play until Schanding took the ball the length of the floor for a layup.

The Lady Jackets were not done. Kim Denkins hit a baseline shot, and Simons hit a layup and converted free throws.

Nicholas County went into the break with a 38-10 lead. Besides Simons, senior cheerleaders Twanna Trussell and Marga Segui were honored.

The Lady Jackets came back into play, and later Saint Patrick off the floor. The Jackets ran up 10 points while the defenses kept the Saints quiet. After a Smoot free throw, Nicholas County held a 48-10 lead with 6:01 left to play in the third quarter.

Saint Patrick did find a three point shot, but the Lady Jackets quieted the Saints with another run, this time a 15-0 spurt that led to a 65-13 lead.

Nicholas County went into the break with a 65-13 lead. Saint Patrick did pick up the pace a bit, and scored six points to close the quarter, but the Lady Jackets holding an 81-32 lead.
