Committee approval of two major economic-development incentive packages, tax relief for our soldiers in the Persian Gulf, and a visit from Kentucky's new commissioner of education, highlighted action in the Senate last week.

In four action, we unanimously approved a measure extending the state income tax filing deadline for those Kentuckians heroically serving our country in Operation Desert Storm.

This seems the least we can do for the military men and women who are sacrificing so much for us.

Unfortunately, because of the narrow wording of the governor's proclamation convening the session, we could not specifically pass legislation exempting our soldiers from state income taxes completely.

However, since President Bush has authorized a total federal tax exemption for all enlisted personnel in the combat area, these soldiers will also be exempt from state taxes due to our conformity with the tax code.

Meanwhile in committee action, our Appropriations and Revenue Committee approved major incentives aimed at promoting economic development.

One involves the proposed Delta Airlines expansion at the Greater Cincinnati International Airport in northern Kentucky. The other concerns construction of a new plant by the Scott Paper Company in Daviess County.

Iola is expected to invest at least \$300 million at the airport, and provide some 2,800 new jobs by 1994. The Scott Paper Company has promised Hughes, Jamie Davis, all of or to build a \$500-million plant Carlisle, and Elizabeth Ann near Owensboro that will employ 1,000 workers.

Supporters of the incentive packages say they will benefit the entire state, not just the specific communities involved. Boyson urged us to resist tinkering with the landmark education reform legislation we passed last year, which overhauled almost every aspect of our public-school system, from governance to finance to curriculum. If we "stay the course" of education reform, Boyson said, we can have world-class school system in five years. Included in the provisions of the education-reform legislation is a requirement that commissioner's report annually to the General Assembly
