The 1991 Kentucky Angus Open Preview Show attracted exhibitors with 106 cattle from throughout Kentucky and surrounding states.

MSU achieves good loan rate

Morehead State University has achieved a default rate of less than 2 percent on its Perkins Loan Program.

At the end of May, MSU's default rate for Perkins loans, the primary student loan program, was 4.97 percent, representing an all time low for the institution, according to Michael E. Walters, MSU assistant vice president for fiscal services.

MSU is well below the 7.5 percent rate that the federal government considers acceptable for funding this program, Walters noted.

The Perkins program and the Stafford Loan Program (formerly the Guaranteed Student Loan) are two of the more commonly used student loan programs. Their success is major difference between the two.

The University is responsible for collecting loans and enforcing the federal guidelines surrounding these collections. He called the resulting low default rate a reflection of Donaldson's management of the Perkins program, while Stafford collections are the responsibility of the lending bank.

Robyn Brookshire, daughter of Rodney and Lisa Brookshire, really started to develop an interest in science at Nicholas County High School, Kentucky. "I loved all my science classes, but it was in high school that teachers really helped me," commented Brookshire.

In the last two years of high school, Brookshire studied disease resistance in cucumber plants and for that project was awarded at the Kentucky Northeast Regional Science Fair, first place in the botany division and best biology project.

Brookshire was also awarded the Hugh O'Brien Youth Award and the President Academic Fitness Award.

Outside of school, she was a member of the 1990 Youth Staff at the State Teen Leadership Conference, sponsored by Champions Against Drugs.

In her free time, Brookshire likes to play the piano and work on projects in the community.

This summer, Brookshire has been further honored by being selected as one of two Kentucky delegates to the National Youth Science Camp, held near Barrow, West Virginia.

Founded in 1963 as a part West Virginia's Centennial Celebration, the National Youth Science Camp encourages some of the nation's most outstanding science students.

New in its twenty-eighth year, the camp annually welcomes a select group of students, two from each state and the District of Columbia, chosen for their excellence in science, leadership and community involvement.

As part of this summer's lecture series, Brookshire will be attending talks given by Dean Sauer, Senior Editor of Popular Science; Dr. Hans Carraway, Director of the Mobile Robotics Laboratory at Carnegie Mellon University; and Dr. Michael Braun, Director of the Laboratory of Molecular Systematics at the Smithsonian Institution.

While the State of West Virginia provides financial and material support, the camp is also funded through contributions made to the National Youth Science Camp, Inc. by interested corporations and individuals such as the Charleston Gazette, E.L. Dupont De Nemours, Harless Foundation, Kabbary, D. Hawkins Trust, Hershey Foods Corporation, Unicofer Corporation, and Union Carbide.

This fall, Brookshire is attending Transylvania University in Lexington, Kentucky, where she intends to major in biology, pre-medical.

Transylvania University is a small school, and Brookshire said, "I'll never get a chance again to have that attention that comes from a small school, and when I return, I'll get back to the school."

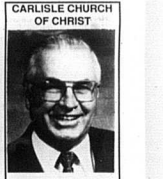
