Conrad resigns as Nicholas D.P.P.

 The resignation of Betty Lynn Conrad as Director of Pupil Personnel at the Nicholas County School system was accepted at the regular schedule meeting of the Nicholas County Board of Education on Monday night.

The board approved a revision to the current lunch program price (see chart) which, she said, the state wanted him to raise the price

of the lunches the first of January, but he didn't want to change in the middle of the school year.

The increase in the lunches will be approximately .10 for 4-8 grades, .15 for 9-12 grades, and .50 for school employees.

Gilbert said, the state's ideal situation would have the food service program be self sufficient, but this takes several years to implement.

Nicholas County School system is currently testing

Nicholas County Superintendent Robert Gilbert said, as far as he knew Nicholas County was the only county offering this service.

Nicholas has been a testing site for residences of Bath, Robertson, Fleming, Harrison, Clark, Payette, and Nicholas Counties.

According to Gilbert the school paid an examiner \$2400 and testing materials of \$395.61 and only received \$1661 for giving the test.

Anyone wishing to take the test can go to the University of Kentucky, Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University, or Maysville Community College.

Board member David Smoot said, "It is a good service to the public, but the expense is a problem. Maysville is close enough for the people to go to if Nicholas didn't offer the service any more."

Board member John Cleaver said, "We should try it one more year and check out how much it would cost."

Gilbert said, "We can advertise that we have the program and let people know it's available to them if they want it. If not, next year will be the last year."

The board approved keeping the testing center one more year and monitoring the progress and then decide about the next year.

The board approved paying \$700 per person to three teachers to incorporate a multi-age non graded primary program during the summer for a pilot program for ages 6-9 for the 1991-92 school year.

There will be four teachers working on this program during the summer months so it will be working form by the fall.

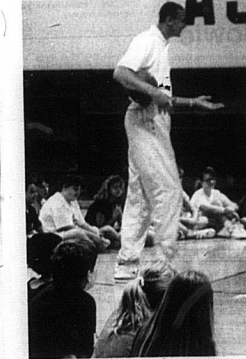
