MSU enrollment up

Student enrollment in Morehead State University's first summer session is up more than 11 percent this year over last year, according to preliminary figures released by the school's registrar.

Headcount enrollment for Summer I is 2,995 as compared with 2,636 for the same period in 1990.

Gains of more than 15 and 26 percent respectively were seen at the graduate and senior class levels.

The increase continues a steady growth pattern in Summer I enrollment which began six years ago.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF 1990-1991 BUDGET AMENDMENT ORDINANCE

WHEREAS the County of NICHOLAS has received unapportioned revenues from the State of Kentucky for the fiscal year 1990-1991;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF NICHOLAS COUNTY THAT:

SECTION ONE. The annual budget for fiscal year 1990-1991 is amended to:

- Increase the receipts of the General Fund by \$15,700 to include unapportioned revenue from other sales, state grant, biotecnological commission grant, and miscellaneous revenue.
- Increase the receipts of the State Fund by \$158,422.20 to include unapportioned revenue from State Unemployment, Services from private insurance proceeds, Youth Services Administration, County State Fiscal, Miscellaneous, and other.
- Increase the receipts of the 2015 Fund by \$25,000 to include unapportioned revenue from transfers in from other funds.
