OUR JOINT COMMITTEE ON PRINTING "LIGHTENS BELT" TO SAVE TAXPAYER DOLLARS

We are all familiar with the well-worn saying, "a penny saved is a penny earned." I have heard it ever since I was a young boy growing up in Kentucky, and have found it to be true wherever and whenever it is applied.
I tried to reflect on that bit of wisdom during my Chairmanship of the Joint Committee on Printing during the past two years of the 103rd Congress.
The Joint Committee's primary function is to oversee the functioning of the Government Printing Office, how well it is being run and examine ways where the line could be held on government publishing and printing costs.
Several people have said the Joint Committee on Printing was "the tightest run committee on Capitol Hill." We were proud of that label and I'm pleased to say that our initiatives were highly successful in saving taxpayer dollars - and we are talking about much more than pennies.
The best estimates I can find project a savings of between 250 and 500 million dollars of operating either saved or deferred.
Perhaps the biggest initiative of the Joint Committee was bringing into general use recycled printing and writing papers throughout the Federal Government.
Now in less than two years, the Federal Government has become the single largest purchaser of recycled paper - over 480,000 tons. Recycled paper is now being used in Congress and all Federal agencies and departments.
In the first year of our bulk paper purchases, the GPO paid on average twelve percent less for recycled paper than it had paid in the previous twelve months for virgin fiber papers, using tens of thousands of dollars.
The Committee also suggested and embarked on many cost-saving measures that have been implemented. A few of these include:
\*\* Directed the first General Accounting Office's audit of GPO's management and found deficiencies in record keeping, policy direction, workforce and equipment usage and high rates of paper spoilage;
\*\* Department of Defense proposal to consolidate printing operations of the Air Force, Army, Navy and Defense Logistics under Navy management. This proposal should save more than \$2 million annually.
The Committee rejected what it deemed "unnecessary" requests for \$24 million in new Federal agency printing equipment.
\*\* Over \$37 million in printing equipment for GPO has been rejected pending the development of a long-term plan that meets the Committee's approval.
\*\* NASA's Inspector General recommended shutting down five printing plants for savings of over \$10 million.
Over the past two years the Joint Committee has effectively demonstrated that we can "tighten our belts" while still providing excellent services to the taxpayers. And, believe me, the American people expect our Federal government to make better use of the resources we already have. And believe the Joint Committee on Printing is proving we can do just that.

CARLISLE - "I Care" That's the phrase that was spoken over and over again at the programs presented at the Nicholas County Schools on Monday.
Director of Pupil Personnel, Betty Conrad, attended a Title V Drug Free Schools program and found a resource that assists school systems to help students battle peer pressure, loneliness and rejection.
And it is even tougher if you feel you don't have someone with whom to talk.
"Trust is a key element and confidentiality is a factor agreed both Conrad and speaker, Bobby Baugh of San Antonio, Texas.
Baugh, a former youth minister, travels all over the United States letting students know that there is an ICARE Hotline number 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
The National Youth Non-Profit ICare Hotline Intervention Program is a phone assistance program making it possible for students to receive instant assistance from trained operators and hopefully, act as an aide to local resources.
There is no vacation from problems and the number free.
The new service in the Nicholas County School District is open to all students and the help is available 24 hours a day.
