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The children will benefit no matter how late the construction goes into the year compared to what they deal with now," he added referring to the open classroom environment that new students will experience.

Cleffler presented a change order to the board regarding the bus garage. Construction will route the sewer line to avoid going through 11 feet of rock at savings of \$20,560.50.

However, upon investigation of the parking lot there is not blacktop in the second area. The chips and all are disintegrated. It needs to be replaced, and with specifications from the State Fire Marshall, that are mandatory, there will still be a credit or savings of \$7,000.00, added Cleffler.

The Fire Marshall also determined that there will have to be a sprinkler system in the elementary school which was not planned for by the architect.

It was hoped that they could get by without due to the cost factor of some \$90,000.

The Fire Marshall said that it had to be installed due to the amount of equipment that is being stored in the building according to Cleffler's report.

The Media Center may have to become an alternate item if the total bid is over \$1.5 million.

Final plans for the renovation were approved with the invitation to bid to be opened at 2:00 p.m. June 18, or sooner if desired.

In other actions, the board thanked the GATE students for their program presentation of the trip taken April 11-13 to Eastern and Central Kentucky, in and out of Washington, D.C. which was not approved due to the Desert Storm conflict.

It was an eye-opener," said Phyllis Guhrle, one of the sponsors of the Gate program.

The students made a filmstrip of drawings depicting their trip. They then thanked the board for making it possible for them to go.

## Stage is set for Lt. Governor's race

LOUISVILLE — The candidates have announced their intentions to fill the office of Lt. Governor.

Seven democrats and three republicans are on the May 28 primary election ballot. The candidates for Lt. Governor are:

Steve Collins (D)  
CARLSLE — Steve Collins, an ex-former Governor, Martha Lave Collins, says it is time for the people of Nicholas County to know I am not a career politician. I want what is best for the children of Nicholas County to know I am not doing anything special interest politics. I know the state government and what is wrong there because all the state's cases have come through my court for the last eight years. I am Chairman of the 1988 Democratic Party that my court has 2500 active cases. I believe in the principles of the state government and I think they can see by my experience that I am not qualified for this office.

Cornis has also been a member of state government in the United Methodist Church in Frankfort for 31 years. He was president of the 1983 Outstanding Citizen Law and Order Award and the 1989 Honorary Doctor of Laws from Berea College.

Pro-Cowan (D)  
LOUISVILLE — "The people of Nicholas County should elect me as their next Lt. Governor. I believe in economic development. The office puts the Lt. Governor in the position to stay in touch with the day to day activities in the state government," Collins said.

Collins ranks the problem facing Kentucky during the next term of Lt. Governor as:

1 Economic Development  
2 Environment  
3 Education  
4 Domestic concerns such as spouse and child abuse and senior citizens.

"I want to take my unique opportunities and contacts to bring jobs and economic development to the state. I think we need to stop the migration of Kentucky's young people by giving them jobs here in the state of Kentucky," Collins said.

To the people of Nicholas County, Collins had this to say:

"I'm in touch with the people. I'm running 28 grass roots campaigns. I work hard, and I'm responsive. I want to be your next Lt. Governor."

Judge Roy Cornis (D)  
FRANKFORT — Franklin County Circuit Judge Roy Cornis says he wants to prove that the office of Lt. Governor is not for sale.

Cornis' campaign has had financial problems, but according to Cornis, "we're giving everybody a run for their money."

Cornis is best known for his aggressive defense as Attorney General and representative who has set the tone for the war on drugs across the Commonwealth.

"We're winning the war, but we can't let it up."

He lobbied the Governor and General Assembly and won the largest budget increase in state history and commensurate county and community wealth attorney to assist in the war on drugs.

Cowan also takes pride in his proposed DUI legislation. His year long study on drunk driving in one of the nation's most comprehensive studies and aided the General Assembly in passing new DUI legislation.

He also pointed out that his U.S. Supreme Court decision has been a penalty case, investigations in environmental and elec-

tion reform, code of ethics proposals, and his tenure on the House budget committee as a record four terms as Speaker of the state's second highest office.

LOUISVILLE — "I don't give a damn about foreign policy or the federal government. I care about the state of Kentucky, and I'm tired of all these whining politicians being elected and not doing anything," Klein said in a telephone interview.

"Let's open this state wide and make all the money go for the people in the state."

Klein, who finished third behind Ronald Reagan and Gerald Ford in the 1976 Republican Primary for President, said he is the one that is in touch with the people of Nicholas County.

"I've been through everything and I know what the people in Carlisle, I'm fed up with all the wimps in Frankfort."

Klein said that his platform is to end the economic development of the city of Louisville, according to Klein, is the economic engine for the state. If Louisville does well, the whole state will benefit.

Klein is a Democratic gubernatorial candidate Gatewood. Klein said an international newspaper on the Kentucky Derby, not the Kentucky Derby, is the answer for the state's economic development.

"I sit in my house and watch good roads being cracked and grass on the side in front of my house. I'm sick of all the crims going on all the drive changing hands while the politicians in Frankfort sit and watch about it. Let's get the money and let's do something."

Washington boasts a record four terms as Speaker Pro Tempore of the House of Representatives. No other legislator has served more than two terms.

"That shows I know how to build a consensus among the assembly and the executive branch. I am respected in Frankfort, and I know how the process works."

Washington has offered a three point plan:

1) Washington would remove the Lt. Governor from providing over the Senate. This would require a constitutional amendment, which Washington said he could get passed.

"Nine other states do this. It would free up the Lt. Governor to use his time for productive time rather than hanging a gavel and being inactive every time the Senate is in session. This would require a constitutional amendment, which Washington said he could get passed."

Washington said this to the people of Nicholas County:

"I am the candidate who does not need a road map to find Nicholas County. My wife is here, and I have always lived here, and I have always worked here. I know the people of this County while I've been in Frankfort. Most of my work here has not met me face to face, but they know how hard I work for what's right."

There are two reasons I should be the next Lt. Governor. One, I am the most qualified candidate. I know Frankfort, and I've had a hand in the passing of some very sweeping pieces of legislation. Secondly, I will have the most interest in the people of Nicholas County. I think the people of Nicholas County know that, and I know it'll help send me to Frankfort."
