**Editor:**  
By now, I'm sure many of your readers have heard about the proposal to build a large, private landfill in Magoffin County, which would accept up to 15 million tons of out-of-state waste over the next ten years.  
The landfill developers are proposing to accept between 4,000 to 10,000 tons of garbage and ash from coal power plants per day. This would make it the largest landfill in Kentucky, on a volume basis.  
We feel that the citizens of Nicholas County would want to be aware of this proposal since the landfill would be located near the headwaters of the Licking River. The Licking River serves as the source of drinking water for our own county water system, as well as for many others downstream.  
The landfill developers have made many grandiose promises about how great their landfill would be, even claiming that people from around the country would travel to Magoffin County just to see their marvelous landfill. But the facts are that all landfills eventually leak. The leakage from solid waste landfills, such as Love Canal, according to a Texas A&M University study, can contain small amounts of arsenic, barium, cadmium, chromium, lead, mercury and selenium, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.  
What is being proposed for Magoffin County is a ticking time bomb that will eventually affect people and drinking water many, many miles downstream on the Licking River.
