Navy Lt. Cmdr. Michael S. Schwartz, whose wife, Teresa, is the daughter of Betty Biddle of 246 East Main Street, Carlisle, Kentucky, recently received the Bronze Star and the Defense Meritorious Service Medal.

Schwartz received his Bronze Star for heroic achievement as Liaison Officer in Kuwait for Commander, Middle East Force, during the latter half of 1990. He was credited with having disregarded his own personal safety in a perilous environment while courageously escorting U.S. citizens from their Kuwaiti residences to the safety of the American Embassy.

His actions were further highlighted by General H. Normal Schwarzkopf, Commander in Chief, United States Central Command, MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, in the Defense Meritorious Service medal citation.

Schwartz is currently assigned as weapons Officer on the Staff of Commander, Training Command, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Naval Station, Norfolk, Virginia.

He is a 1976 graduate of Eastwood High School, El Paso, Texas, and 1977 graduate of the University of Texas, El Paso, Texas.

National Community Education Day Nov. 19

The focus will be on local literacy programs and Kentucky community educators and the Kentucky Literacy Commission join in the observance of National Community Education Day on Tuesday, November 19.

The theme of the 10th annual observance is "Literacy: A Community Affair." In National Governors' Association in 1990.

The Kentucky Literacy Commission has literacy programs in all the state's 120 counties. To build awareness of the role of the community in combating literacy, local literacy workers will promote the observance in counties that do not have community education programs.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson has proclaimed November 19 as Community Education Day in Kentucky, noting that literacy prevents people from leading productive lives and contributes to the generational cycle of undereducation and poverty.

The proclamation urges all citizens to support the efforts of community educators, the Kentucky Literacy Commission, schools and community volunteers to provide opportunities for all Kentuckians to become literate and to lead better and more productive lives.

Community Education Day was established by the National Community Education Association to recognize and promote strong working partnerships between schools and communities. Each year the association chooses a theme keeping with its emphasis on school-community collaboration and lifelong learning.

Stephanie Christenson, president of the Kentucky Community Education Association and Woodford County community education director, said the observance would give community educators an

opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to the nation's educational goals by helping to create a literate populace.

Knowing that every adult American will be able to read by the year 2000 was one of six national goals adopted by the Bush administration and the National Governors' Association in 1990.
