**Council adds disabled parking**

CARLISLE - Jorita Anderson, of the Nicholas County Library, appeared before the Carlisle City Council requesting use of its front parking spaces as designated handicapped.

Anderson said the parking space in front of the library is ideal for handicapped persons to disembark and requested a handicapped sign be placed in front of the parking space to reserve it. The council agreed to Anderson's request.

Council discussed the solid waste collection contract they have with Brown's Hill. There was some question over the contract because it had named Hollar as the agency for collection of trash in the city. Council members didn't know how the contract would work with the closing of the Nicholas County landfill.

Although the contract runs through to March of 1992, it is tied with Hollar using the Nicholas County landfill.

The closing, however, has forced Hollar to seek an agreement with another landfill, possibly with a landfill located in Mason County.

Pending a look into the contract to determine if the agreement between Hollar and the city will remain viable in January, the Council has begun plans to outline the specifications for trash collection bids.

In other Council business, Cheryl Lynn Watkins

appeared before the council representing Phillip McDonald's interests in leasing his fields near Headquarters for land farming of city waste water treatment sludge.

Watkins said McDonald is willing to allow the city use of his 300 acre farm for five years.

Council asked Waste Water Treatment supervisor Gene Kelley to survey McDonald's farm and inform McDonald of the restrictions involved with land farming.

"Councilpersons Ronnie Clark and Sharon Faulstich confirmed the need for streetlights in Green Valley and at the United Methodist Church on North Broadway.

"Clark said he had found a widow to add to the Carlisle Police Department at a cost of \$550. He also said he had arranged for a streetlight updaters at a cost of \$802.

"Council person Betty Barton said insurance on the City Lake requires they put signs prohibiting swimming be put up.

"Charlie Fay requested that a city sticker reminder be appended to the January City bills.

"Carlisle Mayor Frankie Hughes said he received word from Simmons Cable Company that they would include in January, the Weather Channel and a home shopping network on cable. Hughes expressed dissatisfaction with Simmons and asked they meet with the city Council meeting.

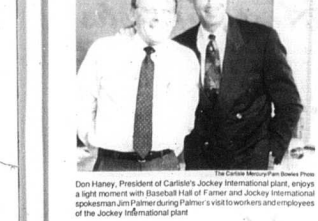
The Farmers Stockyards reported the selling of 1102 head of livestock Tuesday.

**Recycling program debate.....**

Slightly not to go with program," Mills said.

After Mills initial presentation of the options, council members asked magistrates of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court present at the meeting what the court's intentions were in regard to the recycling plan, but magistrates declined to say, wondering finally what the council intended to do.

Councilperson Charlie Fay questioned Mills on what would happen should the city wish to drop from the regional plan if it is not found desirable to remain with it. Mills said the equipment the county/county has purchased is there to keep and operate in any manner they wish.

Fay also expressed concern about the amount of use the equipment will get from the citizens. Will there be enough interest generated by the public to warrant going to the expense of getting the equipment?

Clark added to the concern because of problems of possible funding for the operation of the recycling station. He felt that city residents may end up being taxed twice by the city and county to maintain

the function of the recycling plant.

To Fay's question, Mills said the issue had been raised in several counties about public involvement.

"It has been shown to start slow and then build. In Paris and Georgetown, it took a while for recycling to catch on, but progress has been recorded in both areas. In some, public involvement has been recorded at 80 percent," Mills said.

As to Clark's concern, Mills said the program is designed to hopefully be self-sufficient. Taxation is not necessarily needed because the return on the delivery of recyclable materials should be enough to maintain it without considerable expense.

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
