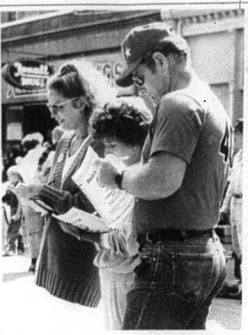

Second edition of the History of Nicholas is to be published

A second edition of the HISTORY OF NICHOLAS COUNTY, edited and compiled by Joan Weisinger, is now being published by the Nicholas County Historical Society. The original HISTORY was the first of its kind for about five years. The book is in conjunction with the Bicentennial Project for the Kentucky Bicentennial to be celebrated in 1992. The new HISTORY will be an 8 1/2 x 11, hardbound book with a Surname Index added and the page or an omitted in this edition. The original publisher will be included in this edition. The larger size will make the print, pictures and maps all more readable than the original. The HISTORY will be published in two parts. The first part will be published in the next two months. The second part will be published in the next two months. The late J. Winston Cole, author, noted Lexington historian, wrote the Introduction to the HISTORY. Many Nicholas Countyans contributed articles for the HISTORY. Over 100 pictures, most lent to the Society by the late Roy Shannon, a native of Nicholas County, are included in the around 975-page HISTORY. Directors state that the Historical Society receives and average of two or three requests to purchase the HISTORY per month, prompting the re-publication. All profits will be used by the Society for historical projects. The Carlisle Depot, for example, which is used by members and non-members alike for community and private affairs, was renovated in large part by profits obtained from the sale of the original book. 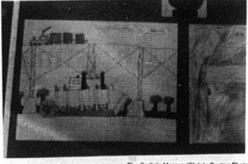

CATS begin transportation services CATS (Community Action Transit System) began transportation services at the Nicholas County Senior Citizens' Center, Monday, September 30. On its first day of operations, CATS provided trips for 15 senior citizens and delivered 34 meals to seniors at their homes. Under a new agreement, CATS has been assigned a driver to cover the center's transportation routes. The driver will operate a 16-passenger van. "We'll take them to the doctor, shopping - anything you can imagine in the way of transportation, we'll be doing," said Paul Park, CATS manager. CATS has been the sole means of public transportation in Nicholas County since 1987. It currently provides about 75 rides to Nicholas County residents per week. "We've been providing in-county services all along," said Park. "This contract with the senior citizens' center will give us more diversity." CATS also serves Bourbon, Harrison, Bath, Menifee, Rowan, Montgomery and Morgan Counties. Anyone interested in CATS services should call the agency's main office in Carlisle at 289-7172 or (800) 548-2287. Qualified Medicaid patients ride on CATS at no charge. The general public can ride at 50 cents per mile. CATS is a division of the Community Action Council for Bourbon, Harrison and Nicholas Counties.
