Stoney Creek Bridge complete; new road work started on Stoney

STONEY CREEK — The completion of the new bridge on Stoney Creek Road about a half mile from U.S. 68 has prompted another new improvement to the old county roadway. The road is essentially open for traffic, the straightening of a hard curve approximately 1500 feet from the bridge has been ongoing since the bridge was complete, Nicholas County Judge-Executive Rose Smoot said. County road workers have stripped and pulverized the asphalt of the old road and have filled in the gap with its rubble, Smoot said. The area, which has been a source of complaint for residents because the road, which is basically one lane, turns so sharply drivers cannot see opposing traffic until they are practically on top of them, Smoot said. "There's been quite a few accidents here over the years and now that we had the equipment at the scene for the bridge work, we went on and started the project," Smoot said. As it stands now, most of the work to straighten that section of roadway has been

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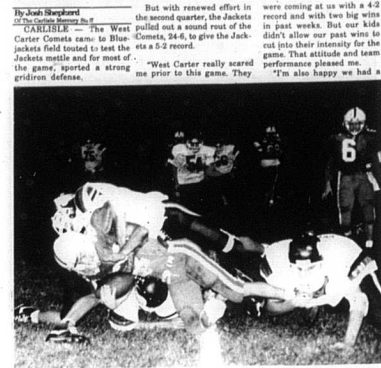

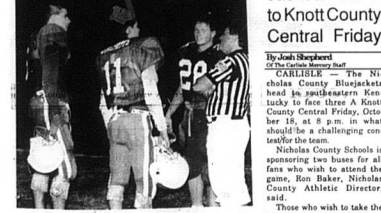
Jackets defense holds tough for a 24-6 homecoming victory over West Carter

By Josh Shephard... CARLISLE — The West Carter Comets came to Blue Jackets field tonight to test the Jackets' mettle and for most of the game, sported a strong gridiron defense. But with renewed effort in the second quarter, the Jackets pulled out a second rout of the Comets, 24-6, to give the Jackets their 10th straight victory. "West Carter really scared me prior to this game. They were coming at us with a 4-2 record and with two big wins in past weeks. But our West Carter didn't allow our past wins to get into their intensity for the game. That attitude and team performance pleased me. "It's also happy we had a good crowd to come in and support us through the Paris game as well as with West Carter. "Knowing so many people are behind you means a great deal," Head Coach Greg Fletcher said. The Jackets received at the start of the game. Kevin Morris took the kickoff to the Nicholas County 23 yard line. But right from the start the game quickly turned into a defensive struggle. At second down and 10, Daniel Brown attempted a pass to catch. The ball caught on the elbow of a Jackets blocker and was sent spinning away as a rush from West Carter converged on the fumble tumbly yards from the goal line. But the Jackets mounted an impenetrable defensive wall, chine began quickly, using Chris Jones slammed Chad Carroll on the line of scrim. CARLISLE — The Nicholas County Bluejackets head in southeastern Kentucky to face three A Knott County Central Friday, October 18, at 6 p.m. in what should be a challenging contest for the team. Nicholas County Schools is sponsoring two buses for all fans who wish to attend the game. Ron Baker, Nicholas County Athletic Director, said. Those who wish to take the bus should contact Baker or the High School office for details and to sign up as there are a limited number of spaces available. The cost is \$3 per person and the bus is tentatively scheduled to depart from the High School at 3:30 p.m. Friday. Knott Central is standing at a 3-4 record with a bus to Whitley County last Friday night. A defeat of Nicholas County would give them a shot for a winning record this season. "Knott Central will be tough for us to face. They're three A and even though their numbers aren't disproportionately more than us, they run out of the wilderness with an unbalanced line, just like Eteland and West Carter three at us," Letcher said. Nicholas County running back Raymond Brown, who suffered a contusion to his left hand during the contest with West Carter, has said he feels able to return to the field however Nicholas County coaches and staff have not made a decision at this time. Though Brown's hand did not break and there is some question about whether he will return to the field for Friday's game. However, Letcher said Raymond will be missed more on defense than offense. "We have Jones, Morris, and Kenney who can replace Raymond fairly well on offense. Defensively, Raymond is a good linebacker and has made key plays if the runner gets outside of their line. But our team is outstanding and I don't view Raymond's sitting out as a major setback," he said.

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
