

Extended services extends to after school

CARLSLE—The Extended Services Program this summer, held at Nicholas County High School, was a great success, said Bill Guthrie, Coordinator of the Extended Services Program.

The Extended Services Program is available for kids who have failed or are at risk of failing a class or being re-

tained in the same grade another year, Guthrie explained. The funding for this new program is through a grant from the Kentucky Department of Education. It is optional to apply for these grants, but with this additional funding of \$90,000, the cost of the extended school program will be covered.

"This will provide additional instruction for those students who did not success-

fully complete a course or grade level, he said. The students are chosen on a "need" basis. Those students who had failed because of reading skill deficiencies are top priority.

Also, teachers are asked to identify students who would benefit from further developing their reading skills as they could do better in future classes.

Some kids need supervised help beyond the regular school

hours," Guthrie said. "Failing is a blow to self-esteem and this self-esteem is a vital part of the learning process."

It is very important for students to remain in the same grade as their friends and not being able to do so affects them negatively," he said.

According to Guthrie there were 78 students who successfully completed the summer school program.

"We plan to do a follow-up program during the school year."

There will be one teacher hired for each grade level to conduct these classes after school. The teachers will be chosen on a volunteer basis.

We plan on having the reading program available one day a week, where we will

work with the same group of students who attended the summer session.

In addition to this, a math class will be offered to eligible students who are considered at risk.

The students involved in the math program will be chosen in the same manner as the students for the reading program were chosen.

The tentative day for the extended reading program will be held on each Tuesday after school and the math will be held on Thursday.

The math program will be conducted only through the school year and not in the summer," he explained.

Next year we hope to extend the summer program to last for seven weeks instead of six and begin class at 8:30 a.m.

and run until 1:30 p.m., he said.

It's important for students to be able to enjoy their summer break and by letting class out earlier they will have more time to do so," Guthrie said.

By the end of the school year we hope these students will have developed the necessary skills so they can move on with no additional summer or after school instruction, he said.

"I don't foresee us working with the same group of students year after year," he said.

According to Guthrie, the summer school program was a success because of the teachers hard work and their ability to vary the instruction and keep the students interested.
