Hollar granted solid waste bid

Carlisle — The Nicholas County Fiscal Court made a unanimous decision to grant solid waste pick-up in Nicholas County to Brownie Hollar, at their regular meeting on Tuesday September 10. Also present at the meeting were representatives from Rumpke and Turley Sanitation, who had bid on the solid waste pick-up. Rumpke's bid was \$7.50 a month for trash collection which could be renegotiated 90 days before the contract expired for the next year. The Turley Sanitation bid was the lowest at \$6.20 a month for trash collection, but the contract had a clause which stated, "If the government passed additional stringent regulations on landfills, that they reserved the right to raise the cost of pick-up to cover the added expenses." The members agreed that having the clause in the contract was too risky. Daryl Stacey, Nicholas County Magistrate said, "We can't accept a bid from someone, if they can turn around in a couple of months and raise the cost \$3 or \$4." Rumpke's bid was rejected because Hollar's bid was \$5.50 lower a month. Hollar bid a \$7 charge for the first year of trash collection and a \$7.75 option for the second year. "I have three trucks that are ready to go now. I could start the collection tomorrow, if you needed me to, and take care of the entire county. The trash will be taken to
