

Paintsville Panthers football preview

The Bluejackets will be deep in district play for the next three weeks as they face one more home game Friday at 8 p.m. next week, their second district game, against Walker Brugh's Paintsville Panthers.

Afterwards they hit the road for district games against Rowland and traditional rival Paris.

"We've won our first district game, but from here, nothing gets easy. Paintsville is a tradition rich school with one of the best coaches in Kentucky. We are going to have to be prepared and work on our outside running game. That's where we tend to be weakest," Nicholas County

Head Coach Greg Letcher said. Walker Brugh, recently inducted in the Kentucky High School Football Hall of Fame as the winningest active coach in Kentucky, brings a strong team to Nicholas County.

In an earlier interview, Brugh said his team was coming along fine, although they had not yet performed to their potential.

Last year the Panthers logged a respectable 6-5 record, but at the end of the year they lost 12 seniors. However, 11 experienced seniors have come into the open spots and they have a reputation for playing good, straight ahead football.

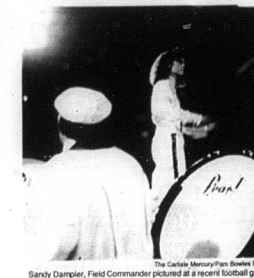
